SS. Philadelphia overtook at Seattle, Wash., from Alaska with 200 passengers.

In a church riot at Nantes, France, two girls were arrested on the charge of hitting policemen.

The text-book commission's report is to be ready for the government early in January.

Feared in Hamilton that Herbert Collins and Norman Faulkner, were drowned while skating.

Mrs. Kate Hyde Pearson, arrested in Montreal, on a charge of issuing a worthless cheque, in Toronto, arranged matter.

There will be no dissolution of parliament as a result of the action of the House of Lords in defeating the government's amendment.

David Butler, the Orwell, East Elgin, hotel-keeper, has applied to the divisional court for leave to appeal against the finding of Judge Coulter.
