SENTENCE OF DEATH

MAY BE COMMUTED TO IMPRISONMENT.

Rear Admiral Nebogoff is Among Those Who Will Suffer—Prisoner Scores Prosecution For Its Ignorance—Decision of Court-Martial.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 26.—The court-martial which has been trying Rear Admiral Nebogoff and seventy-eight officers of his squadron for surrendering to the Japanese at the battle of the Sea of Japan, on May 28th, 1905, has handed in its decisions.

THE MISSIONARY ARMY.

There Are 29,386 Stations and Many Workers.

Boston, Dec. 26.—A statement of the evangelized forces now working in the non-Christian world, made public today, shows a total of 29,386 stations and outstations; 6,750 men and 6,039 women missionaries, 70,735 native laborers, 1,349,000 communicants, 1,120,822 under instruction, and an increase of \$18,605,749 American women missionaries outnumber the men 3,031 to 2,043. Native contributions were \$1,262,292, making the total income of American societies was \$8,260,321.

Lawson, Boston, is building a yacht to sail for the King Edward cup, at Cowes, Isle of Wight, next year, and three American yachts are now entered for the German Emperor's cup, the race for which will take place at Kiel, the Eastern Yacht Club is considering an invitation to take part in a series of national and international races on the coast of Spain, under the auspices of the Club Nautico, of St. Sebastian, next July.
