A BRIGHT ARTICLE BY A CANADIAN.

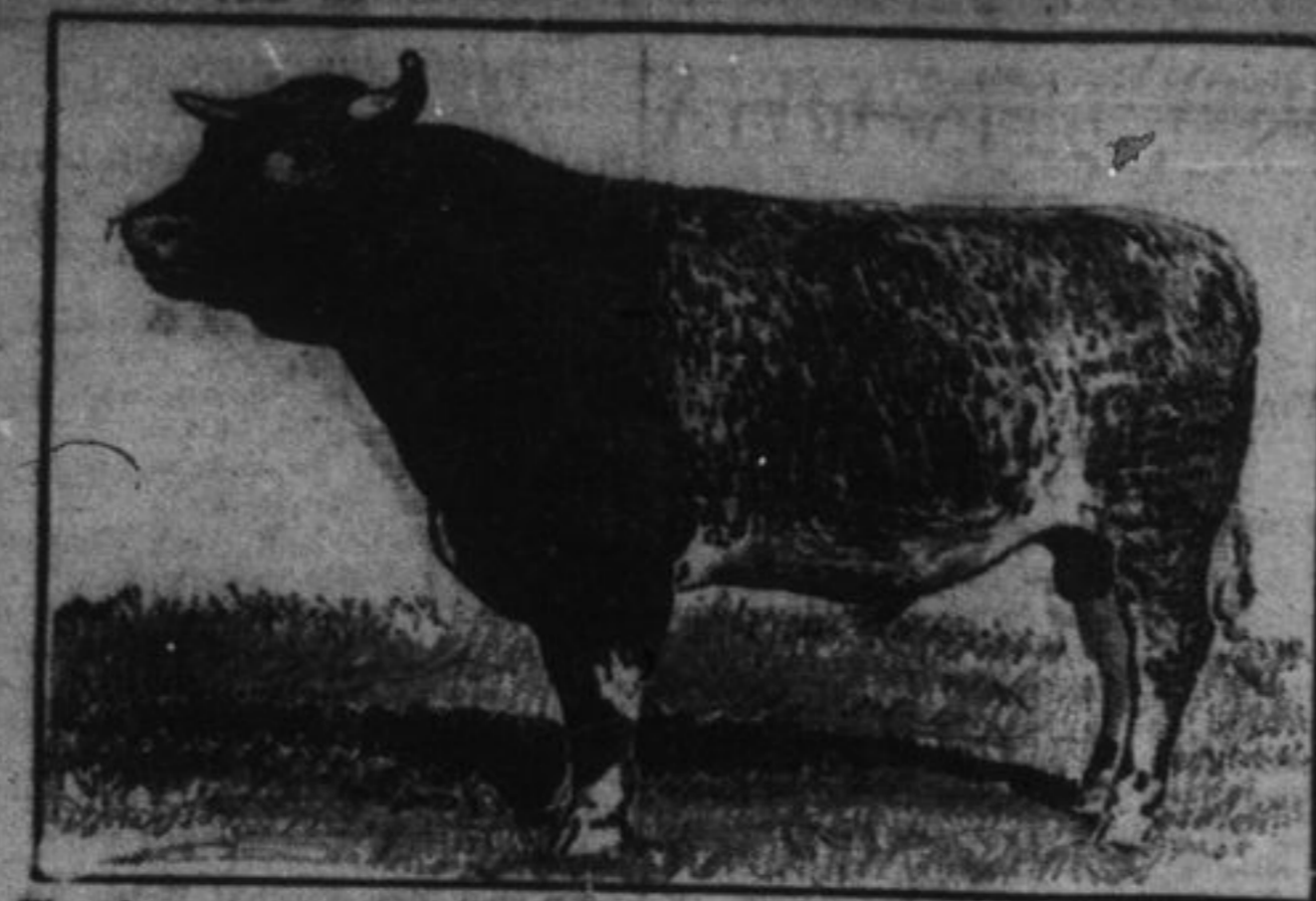
Who Bears a Much Respected Kingston Name—Tells of That Country's Love of Revolution.
