The Crisis in France.

There is a lull in the activities of the French government against the Roman Catholic church, but there is not an end to the difficulties which have so far in this month resulted disastrously to the religious institutions.

On December 11th the Concordat, or contract passed by the great Napoleon, was abrogated. The clergy no longer drew their support from the public funds. At the same time public worship was forbidden except under direction of associations which were approved by the state.

The result has been a serious one. The church property, churches, seminaries and presbyteries have been sequestered. The head of the church in France has been driven out. The theological students have been ordered to do military service.

There is a feeling extant that the differences between the church and government would not be quite so acute but for the cardinal secretary of state, Merry del Val. It is suggested that steps have been taken to remove him and put in his office one who is possessed of the spirit of compromise.

Nurse Confesses

LONG TRAIN OF EVIL FOLLOWS WILFUL PERJURY. Ruined a Home, Destroyed Reputations, Drove a Woman to Suicide and Fooled a Jury—Remarkable Story From Australia.

Vancouver, Dec. 29.—An amazing confession of wilful perjury, that ruined a home, destroyed reputations, forced a woman to suicide, and made a fool of jurymen is brought from Australia by the Acragani. The confession is that of a female nurse named Greville, who has just been sentenced at Sydney, N.S.W., to two years' imprisonment for obtaining goods under false pretences. It has drawn attention to the terrible injustice that may be inflicted on innocent persons by wilful perjurers in the courts.

The woman, according to her own statements, considered with another woman nurse named Kathleen Dwyer to give false evidence in a civil case, which resulted in the jury returning a verdict for \$700 damages against Walter Greville, who was charged by principle of Dwyer with having beaten her and torn her clothes at a private hospital where Dwyer was nurse, and where Penzance's wife was a patient. The Greville woman stated in her confession that Mrs. Dwyer, who has also been recently jailed for two years for false pretences, induced her to give evidence against Penzance. She said, in addition, that she conspired with the Dwyer woman to bring a false charge against a well-known doctor of Sydney, Dr. Chisholm Ross, in connection with a divorce case. Dr. Ross has told that, owing to the false statements, he was joined as co-respondent in a suit for divorce against the doctor of the private hospital mentioned, whose name also was given by the latter woman as so worried by the untoward occurrences that she committed suicide before the case came on for hearing.

This fearful record of unobscured suffering inflicted on innocent persons by two wilful perjurers was referred, according to the confession, by a desire to extort money, so that the two women might live in a whirl of excitement and pleasure.
