- BATTLESHIP A SMOUGLER.—New York, Dec. 29.—Customs officials in charge of Special Agent Clayton are guarding the United States battleship Ohio, in drydock at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and every one leaving the ship is closely watched for smuggled goods. The bag was found to have aboard costly ornaments from China and Japan, together with fine silver and other articles of rare value. A partial list of goods seized is as follows: Three thousand brushes and other toilet articles. Hundreds of pieces of Chinese and Japanese bric-a-brac. A large collection of art objects and curios from Chinese workshops. Many solid silver eggs, engraved with typical Chinese scenes. Boxes of the finest silks from the looms of China and Japan. Costly laces. Most of these goods were thrown in magazine lockers and put under guard. Officers and men were given no chance to pay duty and reclaim them, except in certain instances. It is understood that most of the officers paid the duty demands and regained possession of their goods. The Ohio arrived on December 2nd. Word already had come that she was a treasure ship. It is customary for the customs officers to make a perfunctory inspection, giving the officers an opportunity to declare dutiable goods. Usually, the officers who have marks that is dutiable, and not exempt, declare the goods and pay the duty. It is a rare case where the customs officers are compelled to take such strong measures as are involved in a thorough search of a ship. It was declared that the kit and trunk of every one of the 724 men and the seventy-five marines were searched; also the cabins and effects of the twenty-four officers. The agents went far enough to discover the biggest lot of smuggled goods that ever came over on a government ship, so far as the public has been informed.
- Milling in London.—The metropolis is a growing milling centre. Within the past three years its milling capacity has been increased by about 150 sacks per hour. The milling capacity of the metropolis—namely, 300 sacks of 250 pounds per hour—is equal to 140 hours per week, or an annual capacity of 77,000 sacks, or an average of 100,000 sacks. Liverpool, the most important milling centre in the United Kingdom, has an hourly milling capacity of 630 sacks, and a yearly capacity of 4,700,000 sacks.
