STUDHOLME IS HERE

HAMILTON'S LABOR REPRESENTATIVE IN THE CITY.

Will Work in the Interests of Dr. Richardson—Addressed Meeting of Laborers Last Night in Labor Hall.

In connection with the labor candidate, Dr. Richardson's majority campaign, Allan Studholme, M.P.P., labor candidate, recently elected in Hamilton, is in the city, and, on Wednesday night, addressed a mass meeting of laborers in Labor hall.

"Why, I am here in the interests of the workingmen's candidate, Dr. Richardson," was the reply. "We want to awaken the workingmen of Kingston so that they will put their own representative in last, as they did in the city of Hamilton."

"How do you think the election will go?"

"Well, I only reached the city yesterday, and I have only the reports of the workers to go by; they say that their candidate is sure of election."

Mr. Studholme says that he has been quite busy since he arrived here. "You know the labor candidate's work from early morning until late at night," he said.

When about to go into the Labor hall, several men came down the stairs, and Mr. Moberly introduced Mr. Studholme to each one as "the man who did the trick in Hamilton."

Mr. Studholme will address several meetings during the week, and will return to Hamilton, on Monday, to cast his vote for the labor candidates in the field for municipal honors there.

Mr. Studholme says that the Hamilton labor party have twelve men in the field for aldermanic honors, with two running for school trustees.

Mr. Studholme was asked what side he would take in the legislature. He said that he was on the independent ticket, and that his vote would always be cast in the interest of the people. It would matter not to him how popular any party might appear, unless he considered it in the best interests of the people, he would not support it.

Mr. Studholme is over sixty years of age, short, and of light build. He was born in Birmingham, Eng., and has resided in Hamilton thirty years. He is a cooper, by trade, and has worked in the iron foundry of the Brantford, where he entered the employment of his uncle. His family formerly lived in Pittsburg. The remainder of his family is in Brantford.

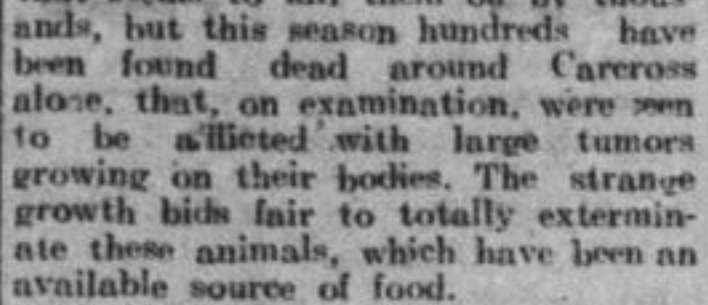

RABBITS DYING OFF.

Strange Malady Raging Among Wild Ones.

Vancouver, B.C., Jan. 3.—News of a strange malady, which has broken out among the wild rabbits in the north, was brought to the city by Captain J. Fitz Horrihan, of the North-West Mounted Police. The wild rabbits, usually so plentiful in the north, are being almost exterminated this season, by some strange affliction that is carrying them off in large numbers.

Every seven years the rabbits become very scarce through some sickness that seems to kill them off by thousands, but this season hundreds have been found dead around Carcross alone. That, on examination, were seen to be afflicted with large tumors growing on their bodies. The strange growth bids fair to totally exterminate these animals, which have been an available source of food.

WHY GROW OLD OR DIE

SCIENTIST HAS DISCOVERED ELIXIR OF LIFE.

Baths of High Frequency Currents Will Keep Blood at Normal Tension—Only Remains to Checkmate Microbes From Without, and Then—Perpetual Health.

New York, Jan. 3.—The Sun has received the following cable despatch from Paris:

"Provided this electrical cleansing is followed by auxiliary treatment in expelling from our bodies the morbid waste caused by electricity, there is no longer any internal reason for growing old or even dying."

This is the promise held out by the Matin after a lengthy explanation of Prof. d'Arsoval's high frequency current electric treatment. The discoverer, who is one of the most eminent members of the Academy of Sciences, says the majority of people die of arterio sclerosis. He uses a sphygmometer to measure the tension of the blood in the arteries. If the mercury of the instrument marks fifteen or sixteen centimetres it shows a normal tension. If the tension is higher or lower Prof. d'Arsoval states that six baths of the high frequency current will bring it to the normal, where it will remain, all danger of arterio sclerosis being removed.

These baths of five to ten minutes each may be taken three times a week. They give the patient absolutely no sensation. It only remains to find a method of checkmating microbes from without, and the Matin believes the world will possess the means of perpetual health.
