**COMMERCIAL MATTERS.**  
**That Is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.**  
The failures in Canada for the week were 19; same week, 1909, 36. It is estimated that the total value in the United States will start 1907 with business on their books valued at more than 500,000,000.  
It is estimated that nearly 4,000 acres of cedar trees are cut down annually to provide the material for lead pencils.  
Smokers said a tax of \$5,985,264 to the Dominion government for the privilege of using tobacco, snuff, cigars and cigarettes.  
Grand Trunk Railway System earnings from December 22nd to 31st, were as follows: 1906, \$1,239,143; 1905, \$1,179,979; increase, 53,070.  
Business failures in the United States, according to R. G. Dean & Co., during the year 1906 were 10,212 in number and \$120,578,961 in amount of defaulted indebtedness, against 11,220 failures in 1905, when liabilities were \$122,476,172.  
Hiram N. Sage will be the next president of the Chinese Board of Trade. He has been nominated on the harmony ticket.  
H. M. McConnell, Montreal, who has been in India for the last two and a half years, wonders why Canadian business men do not make an effort to secure their share of the big trade with India that country or western coast.  
It is estimated that nearly \$200,000,000 will be distributed in dividends and interests this month. The B.H. railroads will put out \$2,305,244, and the Canadian Pacific will show nearly as large a sum. The New York City banks are ready with more than six millions, and the various railroads have important offers in the "outlook" will divide about \$110,000,000. The \$100,000,000 corporations in that city will distribute about \$30,000,000.
