LAD HAS BAD LUCK. Funds Were Short and Seeks Protection of Police. With but a few pennies in his pocket a seven-year-old lad called at the police headquarters last night and asked to be allowed to stay over night. He said that he had no friends in Kingston. He was taken in, however, by a man who had been last fall on one of the Galvin boats from Detroit. He had secured work for a few weeks at a time in different lines, but had not been able to get steady employment.

A REVIVAL NEEDED TO RE-ESTABLISH SPIRIT OF REVERENCE. Rev. Robert Laird Says There is a Deploable Lack of it in Canada—Foreign Mission Work of Church of England. "Reverence" was the subject of a forenoon discourse by Rev. Robert Laird, M.A., of Queen's University, at the Sunday morning service in the Chalmers church. The men who had the spirit of reverence, he said, walked closer to God than the rest, and in their presence we feel as though we are passing among the elders of the sacred cathedral. But, said the preacher, there is today a deplorable lack of reverence, and a revival to re-establish that reverence is sorely needed in Canada.

At St. Paul's Church. Rev. Hugh J. Spencer, of Chicago, preached at both services in St. Paul's church, Sunday. At the morning service Mr. Spencer read a report of the foreign mission work done by the church of England, which contained an earnest appeal for the continuance of the good work.

THE WOMAN HELD. Where Toronto's Prominent Men Were Found. Toronto, Jan. 7.—Mrs. Elizabeth Jackson, whose house at 14 Church street, was raided by the police Saturday night, appeared before the police magistrate this morning, and was fined \$30 and costs for keeping a disorderly house. The raid was made as a result of revelations of Grace Cameron and Ruth Wilson, the two girls under arrest on charges of fornication. The girls are said to have named a number of prominent citizens of Toronto as being among the frequenters of the house. The Jackson woman was not allowed to go as the crown attorney said he proposed to lay a more serious charge.

MARRIED BY PROXY. Bride and Bridegroom 5,000 Miles Apart. Berlin, Jan. 5.—A marriage by proxy has just taken place at Marburg, a bridegroom who is 5,000 miles away being represented by a substitute. The bride is a young farmer's daughter, and she was married to her childhood sweetheart, a young carpenter named Stephen Kutz, who had emigrated to America to seek his fortune a few years ago, and who is now a prosperous artisan in Cleveland, Ohio.

Pulled Him. Montreal, Jan. 7.—Montreal's first and only Chinese constable, Lee Johnson, made his first arrest last night, the victim being Lin Top, the first Celestial ever hauled to a Montreal court on a charge of drunkenness. Lin, however, succeeded in escaping the first punishment on his race, for that crime, by putting up the plea that he was sick and "dunk," and he was allowed his freedom.

AT GREYNA GREEN OLD FASHIONED VILLAGE OF A SINGLE STREET. How This Famous Place Looks To-Day—Weddings That Made it Once Important Are Now Altogether Nil. Nowadays one does not dash into Greytna behind a pair of smoking bags with a dogging postboy and a mud-spattered coach. The Glasgow & Southwestern Railway carries one comfortably; though in case of pursuit by angry parents a special train may be hired to whirl one to the Green. Instead of the old inn at Carlisle, where it was the custom for runaway couples fleeing capture to hire for the day ever available steed and coach, the start is made from the comradely citadel railway station.

The train whirled northward, crossing the Eden and Esk Rivers, and eventually penetrating into Scotland by way of the new bridge over the Lark. Out of the carriage windows one may catch a glimpse of the old Lark toll bridge by which the border was crossed in pre-railroading days, writes a correspondent of The Washington Star.
