ATTACKED BY WOLVES.
Starving Brutes Surround West-ener and Team.

Saskatoon, Sask., Jan. 8.—Wolves attacked James Jackson, out driving with a team, six miles from here. They stopped the team, blocked up the trail, and surrounded the whole outfit. After a fierce fight with the wolves, Jackson suddenly turned his horses from the trail into the fields, galloped them off, and getting on the trail again, got safely home. Last night the inmates of a dwelling house not far from here, heard a dreadful howling that made night hideous. This morning they discovered that the wolves had separated one horse from a bunch, chased him into deep snow, killed him, and devoured most of the body. The whole country is being terrified by the wolves, being driven in to the open by deep snow, which prevents them getting food in the usual way.

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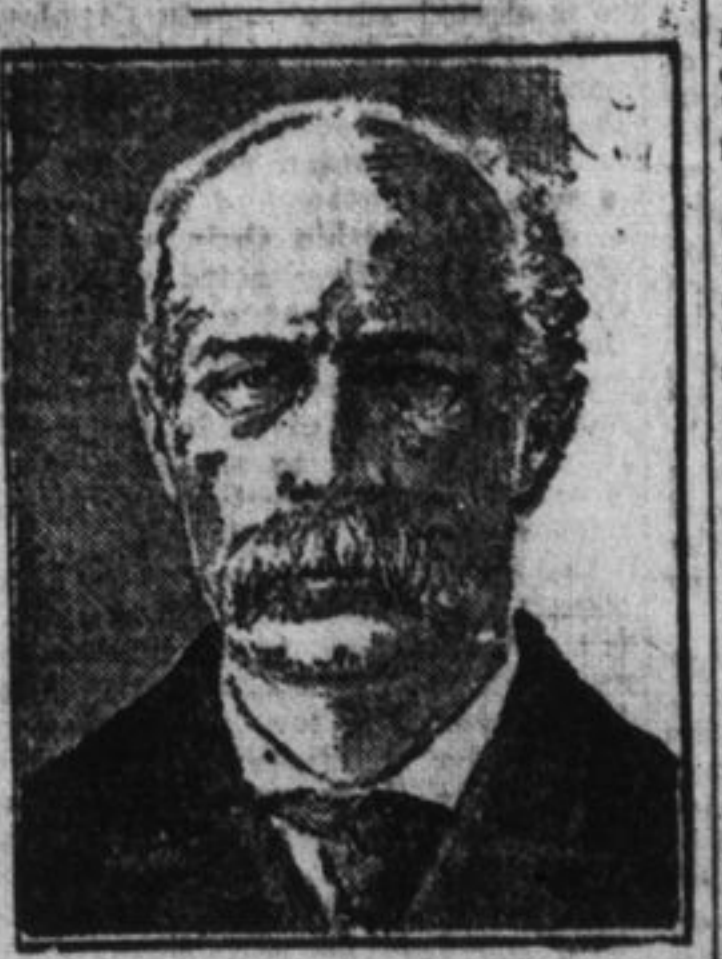
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TERRORISTS SAVED.
Forge An Order For Commutation of Sentence.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—Six terrorists have been saved from the gallows by successful revolutionists here, who conceived the bold plan of using the official cipher to hoodwink the governor-general. The terrorists had been tried by court-martial and sentenced to death, and were awaiting execution, when the governor-general received a cipher telegram from St. Petersburg, apparently bearing the signature of Gen. Pavlov, the military procurator, conveying the emperor's order to commute the death sentences to hard labor for life. The order was officially put in force, but the authorities have now ascertained that it was a forgery by revolutionists, who obtained access to the governmental private code, and successfully utilized it. According to the latest reports, prisoners cannot be executed once their sentences have been officially commuted.

LET UP ON HIM.
Raisuli Gained Much Prestige in Conflict.

London, Jan. 8.—A Times cable, from Tangier, says Raisuli has escaped to the mountains, which fact, added to the additional prestige he has acquired from the severe check he dealt the Sherifian troops, before he was dislodged from his considerable domain. The Maghzen officials present to be satisfied with having burned and destroyed his stronghold and the surrounding villages.

Death At Sydenham.

Sydenham, Jan. 7.—P. W. Freeman, a very old resident of Sydenham village, passed away suddenly on Friday night last. The funeral service will be held on Monday afternoon. James Melroy is still very poorly. La grippe is a visitor in the majority of homes in the village.

Brewer's Mills Items.

Brewer's Mills, Jan. 7.—Farmers are busily engaged securing a supply of wood for winter use. An open winter is predicted. The continuous rain of Thursday and Friday not only carried away the sleighing, but also left the roads in a dangerous condition. Miss E. Berrigan has returned after visiting friends in the city. Mrs. J. P. Lacey is also a visitor. Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Joyce and son spent Christmas time in Toronto in the city. Miss Florence Asselstine returned to her home at Moscow, after spending a few days with her aunt, Mrs. M. B. Richards. Miss Rhoda Day, Union, is spending some time with her brother at Ramothburn. Miss Kathleen Joyce, who spent her holidays with friends here, has returned to her school at Elgin. Miss Eva Griffith, home for the holidays, has returned to Whitby-Ladies College. Miss Spray Boyce has been engaged as junior teacher in the public school here. The death of Mrs. George Dier, Yorker, was a sudden shock to her many Sydenham friends.

Died From Injuries.
Madrid, Jan. 8.—A young woman, injured last May by the explosion of the bomb, that was thrown at King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, as their majesties were returning from church, after their wedding, died in a hospital, here, yesterday. Her death is the twenty-fourth resulting from the explosion.

Gold Strike Near Madoc.

Bellefleur, Ont., Jan. 8.—There is considerable excitement in this district over the alleged discovery of a very rich vein of gold-bearing rock, nine miles north of Madoc. The find was made by E. B. Davis, an old miner, who brought a sample to the city. It has been tested by experts and said to be very rich. It is milky quartz, and it is said, would yield over \$1,000 to the ton. The location of the claim could not be obtained.

Ship Wrecked; Crew Saved.

Madrid, Jan. 8.—A telegram, from Coruna, states that a large sea fish driven the fishing boat Sirouna on the rocks, but that the crew had been saved. Fears were entertained for the safety of numerous fishing boats that had not yet come in.

Severe Sentences.

Berlin, Jan. 8.—Illustrative of the severity of the sentences imposed by the military courts is the case of two revolutionist who, when returning from the shooting batts, entered a dancing saloon, where a patrol found them dancing. Each was sentenced to ten years' imprisonment.

USING BOMBS

Front Of A Building Was Blown Out.

MADE LUCKY MOVE

THE SALVATION ARMY MEETING ADJOURNED.

Rochester Stunned By Explosion That is Believed to Have Been Caused by a Dynamite Bomb—An Exciting Episode.

Rochester, N.Y., Jan. 8.—The entire front of the building at No. 38 North Water street, in the heart of the business section, was blown out about eight o'clock Sunday night. North Water street is a narrow thoroughfare leading off from Main street.

Only a few feet away from the scene of the explosion the Salvation Army was holding a street meeting, and a five-cent theatre was packed with people. The noise of the explosion broke window glass on both sides of the street and was heard for blocks.

A large crowd collected and for a few minutes wild excitement prevailed. The police were called out and the fire department also responded. After a careful investigation the cause of the explosion is still a mystery, but it is believed to have been caused by a dynamite bomb.

The building where the explosion took place was occupied by a large shoe repairing shop. There was a metal chute leading from the sidewalk to the basement of the building, and it is believed the explosion was placed in this. The chute was cut in two and the pieces twisted and bent.

The interior of the building was scarcely damaged at all. No workmen had been in the shop during the day.

JUMPED INTO CANAL.

End of Lady Whose Mind Was Deranged.

Brockville, Jan. 8.—Mrs. J. L. Dargavel, of Elgin, daughter-in-law of John R. Dargavel, M.P.P., met death under sad circumstances. For months, since an acute illness, she had not been herself, and her stay in a sanatorium did not benefit her. On Sunday, Mrs. Dargavel took her to a drive, and, when opposite Chaffee's Locks on the Rideau, the unfortunate woman rushed from the car and threw herself into the canal. The body was almost immediately recovered, but life was extinct. She leaves a husband and a little girl five years old.

BOUGHT STEAMER.

Tadoussac Purchased by Northern Navigation Company.

Toronto, Jan. 8.—The steamer Tadoussac, owned by John Wallie and A. Wright, has been sold to the Northern Navigation Company for \$150,000. The navigation company will place the boat on the grain and package freight route to some port from Port Arthur and Fort William and some other port. The steamer was built in 1903 by the Bertram Engine company, and is valued for insurance purposes at \$125,000. She registers 2,352 gross tons.

A Record Year.

London, Jan. 8.—A despatch to the Times from Shanghai says that the Chinese maritime customs collection, for 1906, amounted to 25,965,600 taels, the largest ever recorded. The year 1906 was a record year for British trade. For the first time it not only reached but oversteered a total of \$5,000,000.

Are On Tribunal.

London, Jan. 8.—Viscount Selby (William Gully, ex-speaker of the House of Commons), and Sir Ernest Satow, who was British minister to Peking, have been appointed permanent representatives of Great Britain at The Hague arbitration tribunal.

Roman Catholic Organizations are making strong protests against the interference of the United States in the Congo. They say the charges of cruelty to the natives are all made by Protestants, and are not true.
