MAIL FOR PICTON
TO GO THROUGH AT NIGHT
AFTER APRIL 1ST.

Boat Service From Deseronto May
Be Discontinued—Skater's Nar-
row Escape—A Lamp Accident.

Picton, Jan. 11.—Official announce-
ment has been received by H. B.
Bristol, president of the board of
trade, from R. M. Coulter, deputy
postmaster-general, to the effect that
the long needed night mail service to
Picton is to be inaugurated on the
Central Ontario railway after April 1st.
The railway company have promised
a better morning and afternoon
service on the line, so that Picton is
favoured.

stage in winter. Now that the con-

off. That remains for the coming
summer to demonstrate. At present
the fact of an evening train presents
pleasant anticipation and puts Picton
next thing to being "on the main line."

Montreal Central Exchange Makes
Recommendation.

Ottawa, Jan. 12.—A petition from
the committee of management of the
Montreal Central Exchange was laid on
the table of the House of Commons
on Thursday. It sets forth, that in
view of the rapid increase in the pro-
duction of grain in the provinces west
of Lake Superior, it is a matter of
the utmost importance, the facilities
of transportation to the eastern mar-
kets should be proportionately in-
creased. As a means to this the peti-
tion suggests that the Welland canal
should be enlarged and deepened suf-
ficiently to permit the passage through
the canal of any vessel which can
pass through the locks at Sault Ste.
Marie.
