**COCKBURN'S TRIAL**  
PRESIDENT COULD KEEP NO CHECK.

The Increases Made in Certain Items Month By Month—A Cigar Manufacturer Found Dead.

Toronto, Jan. 14.—G. R. Cockburn, former president of the Ontario Bank, appeared in the police court, this morning, charged with willfully making false returns to the government. The statements of the bank to the government from January to June of last year were gone into. It was shown that the current loans, in January last, were added to by certain items tallying \$825,935.39. This sum was increased every month till in June it reached \$1,394,994.16. F. H. Pope and W. C. Cameron, both clerks of the Ontario Bank, both of whom the check could be kept by Mr. Cockburn. The case was adjourned till tomorrow.

Henry Montieu, a cigar manufacturer, was found dead in his room at the New Century Hotel, this morning. Heart disease was the cause of death. Mr. Montieu was unmarried and had no relatives in the city.

The body of the man found on the railway track east of the Eastern avenue, near the bridge, was identified, this morning, as that of John McLaren, a traveller for John Beck & Co., box manufacturers. He was twenty-four years of age and single. McLaren was supposed to have been taking a short cut across tracks when he was struck by the train.

**ADVICE FOR INSPECTORS.**  
Must Use Discretion in Improving School Accommodation.

Circulars are being sent to public school inspectors throughout the province by the minister of education, in regard to the improvement of school accommodations. Trustees have regarded these as imperative, and some slight exasperation has resulted in some places. The circular reiterates the injunction that inspectors are to exercise judgment in securing improvements having regard to the interests of education, the capabilities of the premises and the financial competency of the boards. "The keynote of the situation is judicious parsimony," states the minister.

"He proceeds to say in part: 'It has been brought to my notice that some trustees, through fear of losing the government grant, have been induced by canvassing agents to purchase, at exorbitant prices, supplies in excess of what is required. Inspectors are, therefore, requested to take whatever steps they may think necessary to protect the public and if in any case an injustice has been done which demands an investigation, to report the facts in full to the department. As far as possible, inspectors should also see that no favoritism is shown to any firm furnishing school supplies, but that an open order petition is allowed to all in order that trustees may have the full benefit thereof both as to prices and to quality of materials offered.'

**CLERGYMAN'S DEATH**

**LATE REV. WILLIAM R. TANDY, M. A.**

First Entered Journalism—Graduated at Queen's and Entered Anglican Ministry—Furnished Service at St. George's Cathedral.

Rev. William R. Tandy, M.A., passed to rest on Saturday night at the residence of his brother-in-law, Dr. Williamson, after a long illness. In 1865, ill-health compelled him to relinquish his duties, but he always looked forward to restoration and return to the work of his church, which, in the short period of his priesthood, he had served with faithfulness, energy and good results.

The late Mr. Tandy was the eldest son of the late William Tandy, and was born in this city thirty-four years ago. Early in life he entered newspaper work, and in 1891, was editor of the Kingston News. During part of the year following, he was member of the press gallery of the House of Commons, at Ottawa. In the fall of 1895, he entered upon an arts course at Queen's University, graduating in the spring of 1900, as Master of Arts, with honors in Philosophy and English. The previous session he had won in the Leonard Stanford University of California.

Then he entered the Diocesan College, Montreal, having won the A. F. Gault \$400 scholarship, and took the Anglican theology course. During his theology studies, he won prizes in dogmatics, liturgics and church history. After graduation, he took first place in the voluntary preliminary examination for priests' orders, open to all Canada, and in 1904 won the Bancroft prize of \$50 in books given by the Diocesan College, for the best essay on "Reformers Before the Reformation."

Mr. Tandy was ordained deacon in 1902, and priest in 1903, in St. Alban's cathedral, Toronto, by Bishop Sweetman. In 1902 he assumed charge of the parish of Havelock and Belleville, where he remained for three years, built up good congregations, and freed the churches of debt. In the spring of 1905 he was appointed assistant to Canon J. C. Davidson, of St. John's church, Peterboro, and after a month's labor in his new field, he had to resign on account of ill-health.

The deceased is survived by his mother, two sisters, Mrs. A. R. Williamson and Miss Elsie, of St. William, and one brother, Dr. Herbert Tandy, of Parry Sound, who arrived here on Friday last.

Mr. Tandy gave promise of ranking high in the Anglican church. He was a great student and a clear and forceful preacher. The funeral service will take place in St. George's cathedral to-morrow afternoon.
