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QUAKE DO IT Kingston, Jamaica, Was Badly Wrecked. MANY LIVES LOST ANNOUNCEMENT BY WESTERN UNION COMPANY.

Capital of British Island, a City of Nearly 50,000 People, Wiped Out-Cable Interrupted.

New York, Jan. 15.-The Western Union Telegraph company is in receipt of advices reporting that Kingston, Jamaica, has been destroyed by an earthquake, with much loss of life.

The Western Union Telegraph company has received advices that communication with Kingston, Jamaica, is interrupted, and that the city has been destroyed by an earthquake, with much loss of life.

Later Details. New York, Jan. 16.-The following official statement of the effects of the Jamaica earthquake was received here at 10.30 o'clock last night.

Thirty persons were killed and about 200 injured by an earthquake, which struck Kingston, Jamaica, at 4.30 o'clock on Monday afternoon.

Sketch of Kingston. Kingston is the capital of the island of Jamaica, and has a population of 50,000. It is situated on the gentle slope of a branch of the Blue Mountains, and stands on the north shore of the harbor.

Was Not So Severe. Ottawa, Jan. 16.-The earthquake at Kingston, Jan., was recorded at the observatory here, Monday afternoon, 4.30 o'clock on the seismograph, it appears much less violent than the one at San Francisco, besides the earth movement subsided much sooner.

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HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY Members Object to Stipulations in New Act.

Members of the Kingston Horticultural Society take objection to some of the stipulations in the new agricultural and arts act.

There appears to be strong opposition to the clause respecting horticultural societies, which states that "a society shall not expend more than one-third of its total receipts in any one line of work."

The stipulation regarding the expenditure of the money, in that not more than one-third can be given to any one line of work, is looked upon in a very serious aspect, and it is feared that it will prove disastrous to the society, and cause it to go out of existence.

The members are strongly opposed to having any restriction placed on the amount that should be expended on prizes.

The new act will come up for discussion at the annual meeting of the association, to be held this evening. At this meeting the secretary-treasurer will submit a report which will show all accounts paid, with a small balance still on hand.

STREETS UNSAFE Owing to Tottering State of Buildings.

London, Jan. 16.-The streets of Kingston are, to-day, wholly unsafe, owing to the tottering condition of the buildings, according to a cablegram received to-day, by the manager of the West Indian and Panama Telegraph company.

The message states that the shock are still continuing, that people are being driven from the city, and that every body is camping in the hills. The walls of the Holland Bay house are in a broken and crumbling state and while the building stands, it is tottering wreck.

Cable communication has been restored to within eight miles of Kingston. The latest information received here said the number of West Indian soldiers killed in the camp hospital was forty, instead of thirty, as previously reported.

To Carry Food Free. New York, Jan. 16.-The Hamburg-American and the Royal Packet company's line announce they will carry all food supplies for the Jamaica soldiers free.

Relatives of George Shatella Are Anxious About Him. George Shatella, aged twenty-five, a pedler, is missing from the city, and his brother, Joseph Shatella, the former proprietor of a Princess street confectionery store is very anxious to learn of his whereabouts.

It is stated that Shatella left for Wolfe Island two weeks ago to sell goods, and was expected back in a few days. Nothing has been heard of him since, and his brother fears that he may have met with some accident, or taken seriously ill.

"His business would only occupy about three or four days," said Joseph Shatella to a West Indian reporter, "and I cannot understand his absence."

An effort will be made to locate the missing man at Wolfe Island.

The Board Of Health. A meeting of the board of health has been called for to-morrow afternoon, when the ice limits for the season will be fixed. A committee, consisting of the health officer, the sanitary inspector and Dr. Evans was appointed at the last meeting in December to report as to what changes was advisable in the limits, it being held that the limits of last season should not be continued so far as the cutting of ice for cooling purposes was concerned. It is time the board fixed the limits so that the ice dealers may get the necessary permits.
