London, Jan. 17 .- A despatch from St. Thomas, B.W.I., confirms the report of the completion of the destruction of Kingston by fire. It adds that everybody has been warned away from the city. The stench is awful. Famine is imminent, All the shops were stroyed. Provisions are urgently needed. The banks have been burned, but their safes are supposed to be intact possible to give the whereabouts of anybody. The deaths were very numerous, but the number is not yet known.
