No Tidings Of The Great Disaster.

NEWS CHANNELS

ARE UNDOUBTEDLY INTERRUPTED AGAIN.

Doctors and Medical Supplies Are Needed—Bodies of White Found—A Fear That Kingston May Slip Into the Sea—A Second Shock.

London, Jan. 17.—(Noon).—Much surprise and anxiety are felt at the colonial office at the absence of any further news from Kingston, apparently, on an urgent dispatch calling on him to report the latest details was still unanswered this morning.

No News At New York.

New York, Jan. 17.—Definite advices as to the extent of the Jamaica catastrophe are still lacking, early today. Conflicting reports received indicate the death toll must be anywhere from one hundred to one thousand.

Bodies Of Whites Found.

Kingston, via Holland Bay, Jan. 17.—The first systematic search of the ruins started today, in an effort to light the bodies of a number of white persons buried in the collapsed buildings.

May Slip Into Sea.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, Jan. 17.—The shores of the harbor of Kingston are sinking and there is terror lest the city slip into the sea. According to a private message received by a large mercantile house, today, the harbor floor is said to be sinking and a number of houses in many places is now a hundred feet deep.

A Second Shock.

Havana, Jan. 17.—A second earthquake shock, as severe as that which devastated Kingston, is reported, this morning, in a dispatch from Santiago, sent via Santiago. The second shock is reported to have tumbled down scores of already tottering buildings, but it is not believed to have been attended by any great additional loss of life. There was no second conflagration.

Changes On Coast Lane.

London, Jan. 17.—A gigantic tidal wave has swept Annotte Bay on the north coast of the island of Jamaica, according to a despatch from Port-au-Prince, received by the Evening Standard. It is reported that entire coast line has been changed and great stretches of beach have sunk into the sea.
