GOVERNMENT CENSURED.
Member For Lincoln Opposes
Whitney's Policy.
St. Catharines, Jan. 18.—At a meet-
ing of St. James' ward conservatives
Dr. Jessop, M.P.P., for Lincoln, just-
ified his recent criticism of the action
of Premier Whitney, claiming he was
not elected to fill the seat in the legis-
lature for ornament, but to safeguard
the interests of his constituents. He
criticized the action of the Whitney
government by making the grant to
the university, claiming that the pub-
lic schools and not the higher branches
of education should receive govern-
ment aid, as universities were more of
a luxury than a necessity.

Honorably Pardoned.
Toronto, Jan. 18.—Three recently
arrived Englishmen, improperly con-
victed at Smith's Falls on New Year's
day of a doctory conduct on a train,
were sentenced to Central prison for
four months, were honorably pardoned
on Tuesday, by Hon. A. B. Ayles-
worth, and ordered to be released.

FIRE IS OVER

**The Death List Up In Hun-
dreds.**

PEOPLE LISTLESS

**CAMPING IN GARDENS, PARKS
AND RACE COURSE.**
One-Thirtieth of Kingston Burned
—Many Wharves Gone—Names
of Some of the Dead—Food
Scarce, But Governor-General
is Aiding in Securing Provis-
ions.

London, Jan. 18.—The colonial of-
fice, last night, received the following
despatch from Sir Alexander Sweeten-
ham, the governor-general of Jan-
maica: "The evil effects of the earthquake
have been confined almost to three
parishes of the island, namely, King-
ston, Port Royal and St. Andrew.
The fire in Kingston has practically
ceased. Only coal and rubbish are
burning. The district burned com-
prises the triangular area between the
Parade gardens and the sea, Duke
street and Princess street, the parish
church forming the apex of the tri-
angle. About one-third part of the
town and the following houses were
burned: George Bratley, Nellora,
Haggart, Lyons, Solomon, Denegar,
Henriques, and one, not both, of the
Royal Mail Packet company.
"The wreckage is being cleared slowly
owing to the indisposition of the
population to labor at double the
usual wages. A few bodies are still
covered with ruins. The burials, up
to noon this day, were 343. Admitted
to the hospital at Kingston, 446, ex-
cluding some sixty sent to Spanish
town from Kingston for treatment.
"The population is generally in-
clined to the Parade Gardens, at
the race course and in the open
shacks. The people are reluctant to
return to their ruined houses during
fine weather. The usual provision
shops are in the burned area. There
is, consequently, difficulty in buying
provisions. I am arranging other
temporarily and for the transpor-
tation of persons to other parishes.
There was some pillaging, last night,
from deserted shops. The population
is wonderfully patient, but listless.
"Among the killed are: Sir James
Ferguson, J. J. Middleton, A. Na-
than, E. DeCarlova, J. R. Mun-
ning.

SMALLPOX CASES.
Toronto, Jan. 18.—The
prevalence of smallpox in
the province is becoming
distinctly alarming, as
there are more cases report-
ed to the provincial board
of health than for a number
of years past. The type of
the disease is a mild one,
which leads to the belief
that there are many other
cases in existence which
have been diagnosed as
chicken pox.

TOURISTS KILLED.
London, Jan. 18.—The Daily Mail
prints a despatch, dated at the tem-
porary cable station, Jamaica, Jan-
uary 17th, which says that thirty-five
of the fifty-five employees of a tour-
ist's bureau were killed. Rev. Mr.
Pratt, a Baptist minister, was injured
while rescuing an English traveller.
The number of casualties, within resi-
dences, was larger than was expected.
There were eighty men in one of the
wrecked churches. Two of them were
killed and many injured. The govern-
or is gradually relieving the con-
dition of the population. He is driv-
ing the people into the country. No-
body is allowed to enter the city un-
less with food, or in search of missing
persons. The American battleships
Missouri and Indiana, and a torpedo
boat have arrived in the harbor.
The light houses at Plum Point and
Point Royal are a few hours from
harbor, and the entrance and old nav-
igation channel have been changed
and their depth altered from ten to
six fathoms in some places. The Ham-
burg-American line steamer, Prince
Wilhelm, was ashore yesterday
morning, at Plum Point, near her sis-
ter ship, the Princess Victoria Louise.
The steamer Port Kigaeloa was lifted
up on the mud by the shock, but she
got up full steam for her 1,000 horse-
power engines, in four hours, and
backed into the harbor, in the nick of
time. Her point was melted by the
fire ashore, despite the use of her hose.
There have been twenty-one distinct
tremblings since the first shock. Nine
have been felt since Wednesday even-
ing.

Sinking Gradually.
St. Augustine, Fla., Jan. 18.—Wire-
less messages received at the station
on Antistonia Island, yesterday, say
that Kingston is sinking gradually,
that holes and cracks 100 feet deep
were formed by the earthquake, and
that fears are felt that the entire city
will slip into the bay.

Negroes Impressed.
Galveston, Texas, Jan. 18.—The
Panama cable reports conditions in
Kingston very bad, with the death
list nearly 700 and possibly a thou-
sand. Over 400 bodies have been
found and it is estimated that several
hundred are buried beneath the ruins
of the buildings. The injured are es-
timated to number 2,000. The work
of burying the dead and rescuing is
progressing slowly and the military
have impressed the negroes into ser-
vice, although over an hundred have
been jailed for refusing to help dis-
pose of the dead.
The stench is almost unbearable in
some quarters of the city, and the
poor are fighting for food, meat being
the only nourishment available and

**A Discussion Over Fisher's
Scheme.**

THE BINDER TWINE

**WHAT HAD BEEN DONE BY
GOVERNMENT.**
There was a storm in the Even-
ing Over the Appointments of
Senators For New Brunswick.
The Qualifications Were Warmly
Defended.

From Our Own Correspondent.
OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—The major por-
tion of yesterday's session was taken
up with a more or less informal dis-
cussion of Mr. Fisher's meat inspection
bill.
The Kingston, Jamaica, disaster
was referred to by W. F. Cockshutt,
if the matter had been brought to
the attention of the government. He
was immediately ruled out of order,
such a discussion requiring notice of
motion.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier, however, said
that the disaster had been discussed
by the government.
Thereupon, Mr. Cockshutt declared
all he meant to say was that he
had been paid on sixties
million pounds of manilla fibre, which
made thirty-four and a half million
pounds of binder twine.
There was a storm in the evening.
On the motion to go into committee
on ways and means, O. T. Crockett
brought up the question of the qual-
ifications of the Hon. John Costigan
and the Hon. Gilmour as senators for
New Brunswick. He pointed out that
neither of these gentlemen were resi-
dents of New Brunswick. Mr. Costi-
gan living in Ottawa and Mr. Gil-
mour in Montreal.
The premier and Mr. Emmerson
warmly defended the appointments,
and Mr. Foster attacked them vigor-
ously, declaring that these senators
were the property of the people and
not of the government, and that the
people of New Brunswick were being
cheated out of their rights.
A. K. Maclean, of Lunenburg,
brought up the modus vivendi, and
the house was on this at adjourn-
ment.

CANADA TO AID.
Ottawa, Jan. 18.—In
view of the distress and
suffering caused by the
recent earthquake in Ja-
maica, it is said that the
Canadian government may
recommend to parliament
a substantial grant, such
as was made last year, in
the case of San Francisco's
disaster, and that the
money will be made avail-
able for relief work in and
about Kingston, with as
little delay as possible.

Selling British Signals.
London, Jan. 18.—A second yeoman
of the signals, named Abbott, of H.
St. Amant, Paris, was brought to
court martial, to-day, the charges,
against him being very serious. He
offered to sell to the agent of a for-
eign country, said to be Germany, a
naval signal book, but was arrested
as he was negotiating the sale. The
proceedings are being conducted in
private. Admiral Palliser is president
of the court-martial.

At Washington, Feb. 26th.
London, Jan. 18.—Mr. Bryce,
the newly appointed ambassador to Wash-
ington, returned from Ireland this
morning, and paid the usual cere-
monious visit to the king. After the inter-
view was stated that Mr. Harcourt,
son of the late Sir William Harcourt,
would succeed Mr. Bryce as chief sec-
retary to Ireland, though it is also free-
ly stated that Winston Churchill and
Anthony McDonnell have each a
considerable number of supporters for
the appointment in the cabinet. Mrs.
Bryce, to-day, held her last reception
before leaving for her residence in
Portland Place.

Indians Decreasing.
Ottawa, Jan. 18.—The report of the
department of Indian affairs shows
that the Indian population of Canada to
be 103,391, on July 1st last, the net
increase for the whole Dominion ac-
counting to 1,757 souls. This increase
is made up by the inclusion of Indians
not hitherto counted. The gains in
Indian population during the year by
natural increase was twelve and the
gain by migratory fluctuation, 150.
Columbia's Indian population of 24,
997 represents a decrease of 145 in the
last year.

George Is Locked Up.
Ipswich, Ont., Jan. 18.—News comes
from Washington, N.Y., that George
Barker, of this town, is in the lock
up there charged with the crime of
abducting two Assyrians into the Uni-
ted States.

BODY RECOVERED.

The Latest Tidings From
Jamaica.

London, Jan. 18.—A telegram from
Governor Sweetenham announcing that
Sir James Ferguson's body had been
found in the ruins of a cigar store,
and was subsequently buried, and add-
ing that no English officials were kill-
ed or injured, was the only addition-
al information regarding the King-
ston catastrophe received at the col-
onial office this morning. The cable
companies hope that, to-morrow, will
see an improvement in their service.
A special despatch from Jamaica,
dated yesterday, says there has been
no tidal wave. The defenses at Port
Royal were destroyed, and the palisades
broken through, black mud com-
ing to the surface. Fires are still burn-
ing.

ARRESTED BY CELESTIAL.
**But the Chink Had Not Secured a
WARRANT.**
Hamilton, Ont., Jan. 18.—Chin
Chong, a Dundas celestial, consulted
the local police, to-day, regarding the
disappearance of his wife, an English
girl. Chin was of the opinion she had
shipped out with a man named Jones,
and claim the pair took \$200 of his
hard earned money with him. After
telling his story to the police Chin
went to Burlington, where he located
Jones. He made him a prisoner, and
brought him to the city, but as the
celestial had not sworn out a
warrant the police refused to have
anything to do with the case.
Jones was liberated. Mrs. Chong
has not yet been located, but her
husband has sent one of his employes
to Rochester to look for her.

WAR IN WEST AFRICA.
**Going on Between Germans and
Natives.**
Cape Town, Jan. 18.—A despatch to
the Cape Times, from Port Natal,
to-day, says that the negotiations for
peace between the Germans and the re-
volted natives in the southern part of
German West Africa were abruptly
broken off, and that serious fighting
is now going on in the vicinity of
Keetmanshoop. The rebels were said
to be offering a stubborn resistance.

Death Of Ex-Senator Hayden.
Cobourg, Ont., Jan. 18.—The death
occurred at Port Wayne, Ind., recently
of Hon. Frederick J. Hayden, former-
ly state senator. Senator Hayden
was a Canadian. He was born Feb-
ruary 29th, 1836, at Cobourg, being the
son of Rev. and Mrs. William Hayden.
His father was the first missionary
sent to Canada by the Congregational
denomination.

Pocketed Employer's Money.
London, Ont., Jan. 18.—Ernest Syl-
vester, was sentenced to nine months
in Central prison for embezzlement.
Sylvester pocketed money which he
had collected for his employer, and
the young fellow is an opium user, and
the magistrate, in view of this, made
his sentence harder.

To Contest The Will.
Toronto, Jan. 18.—The relatives of
the late Pierce Mansfield, who left
a will, valued at \$10,000, to
Canon Sloan, for Catholic charities
and masses, will contest the matter.
Application was, to-day, made to take
the case to the high court for settle-
ment.
