DOMESTIC REGULATIONS. By even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Province, excepting 8 and 20, not over, may be homesteaded by any person on the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of quarter section, of 100 acres, more or less, in any section of 360 acres, or more, application for homestead entry or more land must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent.

MANY CHILDREN IN CONGESTED DISTRICTS VICTIMS OF CONSUMPTION.

S. Goodfrend, a specialist from New York, declares that ten per cent of the children in the congested districts of Cleveland are victims of tuberculosis.

The same deplorable conditions have been found to exist in other cities and the eradication of the white plague among the children has been started in earnest. Sanitary conditions are being improved, roof treatment, affording fresh air, is given, and nourishing food is being supplied.
