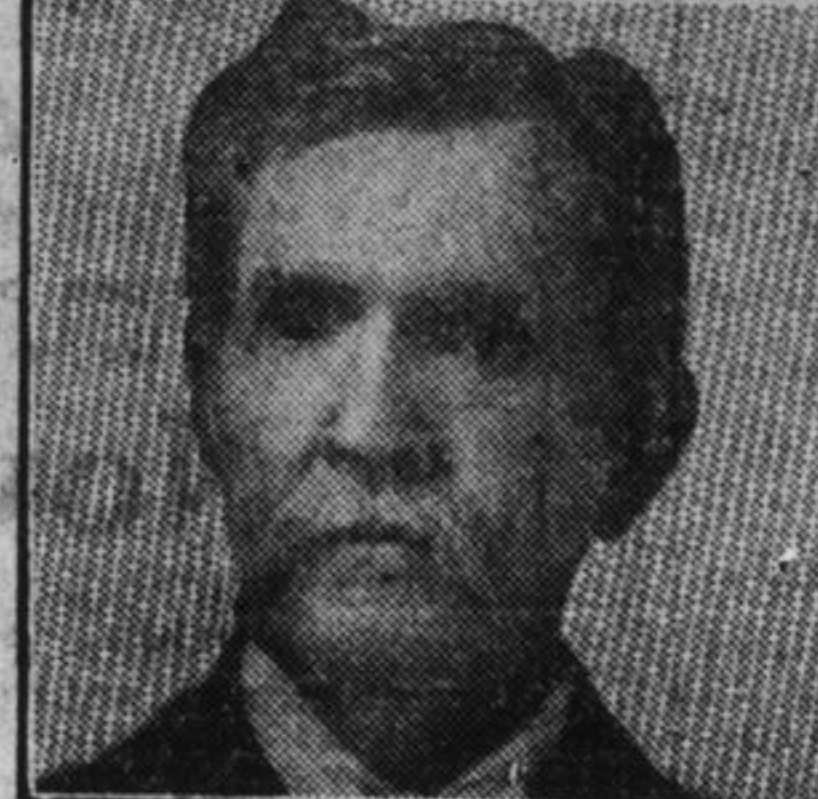

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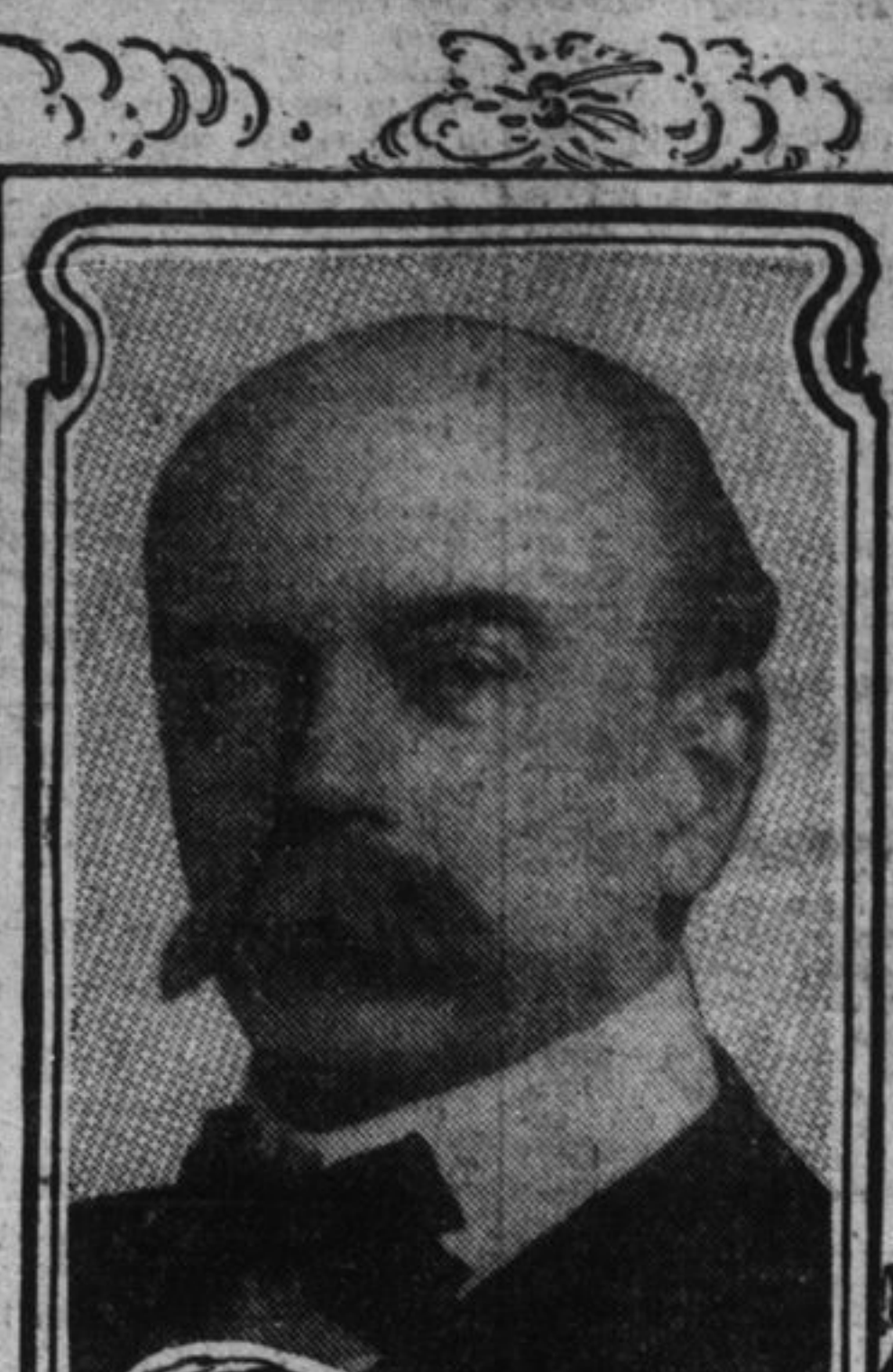

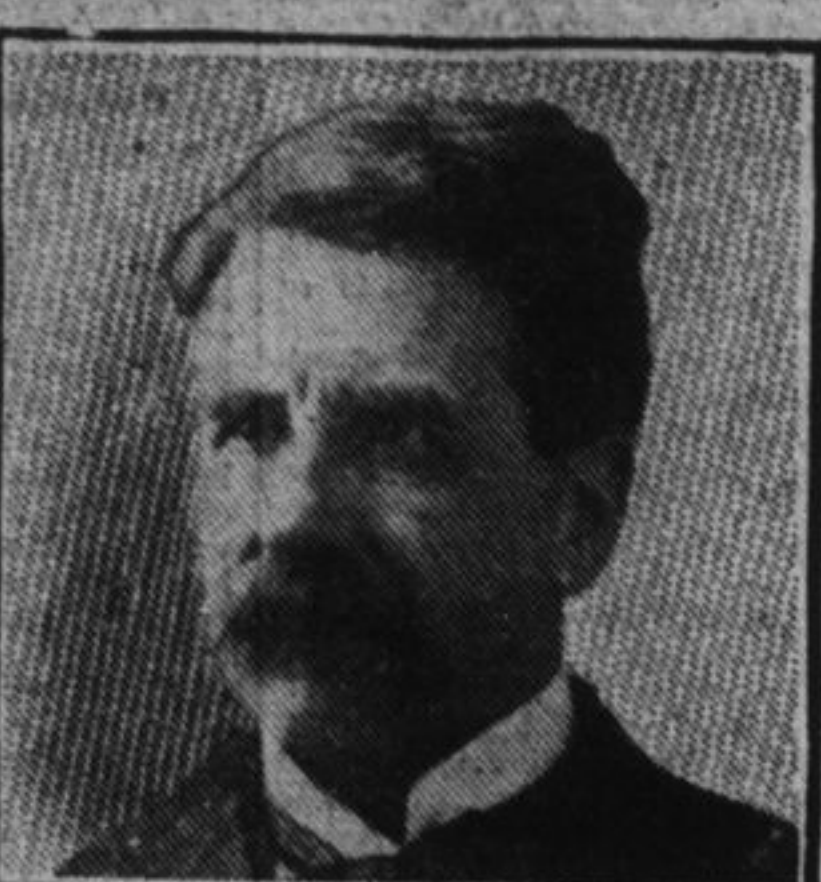

## Kentucky Vagrants Sold As Slaves



"King Solomon" Once Vagrant, Later a Hero. Dock Aubury, Who Was Sold for \$1. Sheriff Yates, the Auctioneer.

That legal slavery is not dead in the United States was shown with startling vividness, a short time ago, when an auctioneer mounted a block at Elizabethton, Ky., and sold a white man for the meagre sum of one dollar.  
It was, in some respects, such a scene as might have been witnessed in ante-bellum days, the difference mainly centering in the color of the slave and the fact that his period of servitude was limited to nine months.  
On the statute books of Kentucky is full authority for selling a vagrant for a period not exceeding twelve months. In addition, the law provides that the proceeds of the sale shall be applied to paying the expenses of the prosecution and liquidating the vagrant's debts, and that what remains shall be given to his wife, if he has one. Needless to say, there was nothing left for the wife of "Dock" Aubury, the man sold for a dollar.  
"Come, men, what am I offered?" Sheriff Yates, puffing from the exertion of a task that would not have been so novel forty-five years ago, pushed "Dock" Aubury forward on the dry goods box, so the assembled men could get a good view of him. "I have here an able-bodied man," he continued. "Never sick a day in his life, but I cannot recommend him for work. It is also said against him that he has a powerful appetite, that he eats everything set before him."  
An old negro, attracted by the crowd, meandered close enough to get a look and hear what was being said. Then he gazed around, amazed, and when convinced that he was awake, exclaimed, "Lawdy, de's sellin' folks again!" and took to his heels.  
An old-timer, Sheriff Yates got into the old-time spirit as he went on. "Make me a bid," he cried. "Some of you men have been slaveholders, and I warrant you never owned no nice a fellow as Dock Aubury. Others of you have never had the pleasure of owning a slave. Here's your chance. If you get tired of your bargain any time before nine months, you can set him free. A bid! A bid! What do you bid?"  
Aubury, good-looking, weighing 150 pounds, with the physical development of an athlete, was knocked down to J. J. Johnson, a blacksmith and farmer, of Rineyville, for \$1—his record for shunning work precluded a higher figure—and was taken away in a wagon to do farm work.  
Owing to error in the instruction upon which the verdict was based, the court later set Aubury free; but his purchaser said that the man had taken on so kindly to the farm work that he should soon have been given a suit of clothes and released anyhow.  
Aubury is not the only man who has been sold into servitude of late years in Kentucky. Occasionally a man comes up to show that the old slave
