## A LIVELY EPISODE

### TROOPS STORM SEMINARY BOMBARDED BY STUDENTS.

Expulsion of Catholics Causes  
Serious Disturbances, But Re-  
sistants Escape.

Angers, France, Jan. 21.—The ex-  
pulsion of a number of students from  
the Catholic seminary at Beaupreux,  
was the occasion of serious distur-  
bances. Troops stormed the seminary  
building and broke in the doors,  
while the students, crowding the win-  
dows, bombarded them with stones,  
chairs and tables. The subprefect of  
police, the commander of the gendar-  
merie and the commissary of police  
were seriously wounded, while fifteen of-  
ficers and soldiers were slightly hurt.  
When the troops finally forced an en-  
trance to the building they discovered  
that the students had escaped over the  
back wall.

A. S. Rogers has been declared  
elective reeve of Yarmouth on a re-  
count.

Mrs. Joseph Silver and daughter re-  
turned today, after a pleasant visit  
in Montreal.

Ex-Governor Higgins, of New York  
state, is dying at his home in Olean,  
New York state.

Vancouver's population is now 52,-  
000, according to the city assessor, an  
increase of 7,000 in a year.

Frank Smith, a laborer, committed  
suicide by hanging himself in the Wil-  
ton avenue station, Toronto.

Justin J. Golden, immigrant agent  
in Winnipeg, has been appointed de-  
puty minister of agriculture for Mani-  
toba.

The trustees of Windsor, Ont., Hotel  
Dieu have decided to expend several  
thousand dollars to enlarge the hos-  
pital.

Mrs. Florence Maybrik has accepted  
an offer from a church lecture bureau,  
and will make a tour of the United  
States.

Small-pox has broken out in Dres-  
den. A patient from Oil Springs  
broke quarantine and carried the dis-  
ease there.

The Earl Grey Amateur Musical and  
Dramatic competition programme  
shows but two musical entries and  
seven dramatic so far.

Mrs. J. P. Lappan, Landowen, and  
Mrs. Dennis, of the baron Spaldeman

Campbell McCutcheon, a young  
rancher, was found dead in his house

James Wilson, a young Hamilton  
barber, who made a daring attempt

was sentenced by Magistrate Jells to  
four months in jail.

During the heavy wind storm, on  
Saturday night, the baron Spaldeman  
broke away from her moorings at  
Sarnia, and was driven on the  
beach. It will be easily taken off.

The Engineers are doing finish-  
ing election speech at a militia dinner  
the other day, urging all present to work  
for the election of a parliament that  
would pass new military and naval  
bills.

Cards have been received in Hamil-  
ton, announcing the marriage in New  
York, of Miss Dorothy Hunting, of  
Hamilton, to Robert R. Chapman, of  
Chicago, who is reported to be a mil-  
lionaire.

An explosion of gas caused a fire  
that destroyed the house of C. How-  
ard, at Wheatland, Man., and the fam-  
ily were turned out in their night  
clothes with the thermometer register-  
ing thirty degrees below zero.

The government is purchasing the  
machinery required for the making of  
its own coinage. This is necessary,  
as the royal mint is so far complete  
that the contractors are doing finish-  
ing work inside the building.

Col. L. F. Pinaud, late deputy min-  
ister of militia, left an estate valued  
for probate at \$22,146. Requests are  
made to the Congregation de Notre-  
Dame, a religious order, of \$4,000;  
\$2,500 each to brothers and all the  
real estate to his widow.

be the liberal candidate in the con-  
test in the riding of West Middlesex,  
of which his father was the repre-  
sentative in the legislature until his  
recent elevation to the senate.

Five large lake liners wintered just  
inside the breakwater, at Buffalo, N.Y.  
were torn loose from their moorings  
and given over to the waves of the  
Hurricane W. Smith, Wm. Notting-  
ham, J. G. Riddle, Munroe C. Smith,  
and A. G. Brower. Most of them are  
owned in Cleveland. They have car-  
ried 100,000 passengers.
