#### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

##### That is Going On In The Business World—The Markets.

The old rumor of a thirty per cent cash dividend on N. P. has been revived.

Predictions of an increase in the U. S. Steel common dividend at next week's meeting are becoming more confident.

A branch of the Mount Clemens sugar factory recently established at Chatham Ont. A. H. W. H. Westman is moving to the mill.

The Leithbridge, Alta. Brewing and Malting Co. has decided to add another story to the \$25,000 addition now being made to their plant.

The rail mill of the Lake Superior Corporation has been turning out 700 tons a day. The rail output this month is expected to run 12,000 tons against 10,700 tons, the previous high record.

The Pennsylvania Railway company has decided to make an exhaustive test of steel ties. It will put down 3,000 of them between Pittsburgh and Altoona and near Pomeroy, Pa., where there is a heavy traffic on any part of the system.

Messrs. J. H. Sanderson, F. C. Baker and A. H. Woodman, of Prince Albert, H. Laumont, Regina, William Anderson, Alton, Sask., and others, of Ottawa, Ont., have been incorporated as the Prince Albert Timber and Lumber company, with a capital of \$450,000, and head office at Ottawa.

### FIREMEN BURNED

THEY WERE COVERED BY COLLAPSING WALLS.

Two Have Been Rescued and Alive Five Are Still in the Ruins—The Columbia Buildings Were Burned Down.

Buffalo, N.Y., Jan. 25.—The Columbia building, at 103 to 107 Seneca street, extending through to Carroll street, an eight-story power building, was burned this morning. About 9:30 o'clock four of the floors were taken from the ruins alive, and nearly well covered by fire. At 10:15 o'clock another man was taken out alive. At that time it was said five other men were in the ruins. The Columbia building was valued at \$250,000, owned by the Joseph Jewett estate, and partly well covered by insurance. The tenants consisted mainly of candy manufacturers, book-binders, jewelry case companies and printers.

At 11:5 o'clock, this afternoon, Chief McConnell said Lieut. Naughton, Di Ruggiero, Hankey and Megan were still in the ruins.

**SLASHED A GIRL'S FACE.**  
Di Ruggiero Sentenced to Three Years.

Niagara Falls, Ont., Jan. 25.—Three years in Kingston penitentiary was the sentence imposed by Justice Magistrate Cruikshank on Dolio Francesco Di Ruggiero, an Italian, for slashing his fiancée, Marie Conti, with a razor. Di Ruggiero fled after the crime, but was captured and he followed a quarrel over ten dollars. The girl's evidence yesterday indicated a very different reason for the heinous attack. Her face was fairly cut to pieces. The police believe the act was premeditated as Di Ruggiero had made previous preparations for flight.

### A BIG SMELTER MAY BE PUT UP IN COBALT DISTRICT.

The Government Will Take Up The Question of What Aid It Can Do—Several Cases in the Courts of Appeal.

Toronto, Jan. 25.—Hog, Mr. Whitney, today, received a letter from a gentleman representing strong financial interests asking what aid the government would give to a million dollar smelter to be erected in the Cobalt district. Mr. Whitney said the letter would be taken into consideration.

Messrs. F. D. Monk, M.P., and J. E. Leonard, M.P., interested in a smelter at North Bay, called on the premier this morning, and stated that the final shipment of machinery for the new smelter was now on the Atlantic.

Mrs. Jane Kern, London, fell on the sidewalk while going to church one Sunday in October, 1905, the accident being due to a broken plank. She sued the city and obtained 600 damages. The city appealed to the divisional court which, to-day, dismissed the appeal.

Patrick Conley, a farmer, was killed by a Michigan Central train while crossing the track, with his rig about six miles east of Windsor. His widow sued the company and got \$3,000 damages. The railway carried the case to the court of appeal with the result that, to-day, the judgment was reversed and the case against the company dismissed.

James Stewart is virtually the postmaster of Kingston. His appointment has been made in Ottawa, but the official announcement has yet to come. As soon as it arrives, Mr. Stewart will enter upon his new duties.

**City League Games.**  
The Thistles and the Beavers start the new season in the Royal rink tonight. The junior series is now complete; six teams are playing for the W. W. Gibson trophy. To-morrow night in the senior series, Frontenacs and Aberdeens play and Whitealers are scheduled to meet the Wanderers.

**Late Mrs. Mary Downes.**  
The death occurred at the House of Refuge, on Saturday, of Mrs. Mary Downes, widow of the late James Downes, aged eighty-two years. She had been an invalid for several years, and was an old resident of Kingston. Her husband died a little over a year ago. Mrs. Downes was a member of St. Mary's church.

**Professor Donned Hood.**  
The idea, so prevalent that the various hoods worn over their surplices by Anglican clergy, during service, denote ecclesiastical rank, got a blow yesterday, when Prof. P. G. Campbell, of Queen's College, appeared in his place in St. George's cathedral church, wearing his hood. A hood is of purely academic significance.

**She Was Married.**  
In a published statement in connection with the British case in Toronto, it is stated that Mrs. Bridget Cullen visited Mr. and Mrs. James Cullen, who were living at 23 Temperance street, at that time "was not married." This is a mistake, as a year before her visit to the Britains.

**Travellers Suffered.**  
Commercial travellers complain of the sufferings endured in rural hotels during the cold snap of the past few weeks. "I had to sleep in my fur coat for nights," said one. "I had a fur coat so I took the hot lamp chimney and rolled it over the sheets to get frost out of them," said another. "Travel in the back country these days is no cinch."

**Dr. Watson in Montreal.**  
Dr. Watson, professor of philosophy at Queen's University, addressed McGill students on Sunday afternoon in Strathcona Hall. His subject was "The Ideal Life." Prof. Watson will remain in Montreal for the early part of the week, and will deliver a course of lectures on the "Philosophy of Religion" to the students of four theological colleges affiliated with McGill.

**Held Another "Smoker."**  
The members of the Masters and Men's Association held another of their popular "smokers" at their room on Saturday night. There was a good attendance, and several hours were spent in a pleasant manner. During the evening program of songs, and stories was given, the following contributing: Capt. **Received Their Certificates.**

**Mrs. Hector Macdonald Injured.**  
Mrs. Hector Macdonald, of Larch street, mother of John Macdonald, secretary of the Board of Education, and Mrs. John Gaslin, fell in her room, on Saturday afternoon, and broke her hip. Mrs. Macdonald, near by eighty years old, is in a serious condition, at the general hospital, her age standing against all hopes for her recovery.
