That Is Going On In The Business World—The Markets.

It is understood that International Coal stock will shortly be listed on the Montreal Stock Exchange.

The Ontario Salt Agency, that has sold most of the salt purchased in Canada in the last two years, is going out of business.

The post salary of Clayton, leased by the government, involved an expenditure of only \$78,510 last year, with a saving of \$20,000.

Trade returns of the Grand Trunk from January 15th to January 21st, show as follows: 1907, \$715,566; 1906, \$675,227; increase, \$40,339.

James W. Baillie, lately elected a member of the Toronto Stock Exchange, has formed a partnership with Alfred D. Morrow under the firm name of Baillie and Morrow.

The C.P.R. is said to hold a controlling interest in the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation company. The C.P.R. is also a partner in the Quebec, Light & Power company, with the street car system.

SAID ARBITRATORS HAD NOT JURISDICTION.

Want a Grant to Improve a River—A Government Caucus Was Held at Parliament Buildings.

Toronto, Jan. 30.—The Beira and Waterloo Street Railway Co. have appealed to Chief Justice Falconbridge, sitting in high court, against the decision of the arbitrators who heard the case between the railway company and the town of Berlin.

The arbitrators decided the town should be permitted to take over the railway. The appeal is taken on the ground the award was made without the arbitrators having jurisdiction, and is, therefore, ineffective.

A government caucus was held at the parliament buildings, this morning, but nothing was given out at its conclusion.

The defence opened its case, in the investigation into the conduct of Governor Vanant, this morning. A large number of witnesses were examined, all of whom testified to the good character of Governor Vanant and the good management of Toronto.

Against the story of religion disension among the guards was related by witnesses. The attempt was made to prove that a conspiracy existed against the Roman Catholic guards and prisoners.

The case against G. R. R. Cockburn, on the charge of signing false returns to the government, regarding the condition of the Ontario Bank, was today, enlarged till Friday.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the Dominion Bank, today, Messrs. James Caruthers, Toronto, and A. D. Nanton, Winnipeg, were asked to the directorate. It was decided to issue the million dollars of new stock, previously authorized, by bringing the capital up to \$4,000,000, and the directors were authorized to issue another million of new stock whenever it was considered necessary.

George A. Brown, ex-warden of Grey, will establish an immigration station in New Orleans.

A huge landslide buried the Grand Trunk track under tons of earth a few miles west of London, Ont.

A telephone service will be in operation early next summer between Macatapia and Gaspe Basin, a distance of 180 miles.

C. D. Blatchford, Hamilton, was taken suddenly ill, suffering from ptomaine poisoning as the result of eating canned tomatoes.

J. Shlez, of Ambrose, was frozen to death, four miles east of Imperial, N.D. He was hauling freight from Flexton to Ambrose.

Ottawa curlers again defeated Renfrew, on Tuesday night, this time in the semi-final of the governor-general's, by a majority of fifteen shots.

Several money order books which make forgeries to the amount of \$10,000 possibly were stolen from the C.N.R. Express company at Winnipeg on Saturday night.

The government schooner Pilot was wrecked during a recent cyclone off Cooktown, Queensland. Seven persons, including Mr. Harcourt, a member of the Queensland legislature, were drowned.

The maritime express had a bad smash up near Windsor Junction, N.S., on Tuesday evening. Fortunately, and almost miraculously, no one was killed, but several passengers were more or less injured.

At Uniontown, Pa., Tony Sain, a foreigner, went to a coke oven, deliberately undressed in the cold, and three himself, naked, head first into the bed of a stream.

Lewis Johnson, a homesteader, living six miles north of Imperial, N.D., was frozen to death near his shack. His body was found after three days. He was caught in a storm while making a six-mile trip home from his father's farm.

CAMP ON JUNE 17th. Land Being Purchased For The New Rifle Ranges.

The Kingston district military camp is to be held, at Barrickfield, commencing on the Saturday before Dominion day. The new rifle ranges will be all ready before the camp begins.

The necessary land in Pittsburg is being purchased. Some owners do not wish to sell, and urgent measures may have to be adopted by the government to secure the portion of their land required. Most of the necessary land has already been purchased. By April 1st the construction of the ranges will be started.

ADVANCED POSITION.

The Policy of the New Leader.

Toronto, Jan. 30.—In the closing portion of his first speech as leader of the opposition in the legislature, yesterday afternoon, G. P. Graham, said: "I do not want to have any mistake, and for that reason I here enumerate the things that we (the opposition) stand for:

"We stand for a practical and progressive forestry policy now and for the future."

"For the abolition of contract labor or at the Central prison on any terms."

"For fair play to legitimate investment, but not one cent for watered stock."

"For rational capitalization and limitations of the powers of such corporations as the Standard Oil and other companies that are endeavoring to take money out of Canada."

"Absolute and unassailable titles by the government."

"Free school books as part of the equipment of the public and separate schools."

"Cheap power for the municipalities and the people."

"Economic management of the provincial business, notwithstanding the buoyancy of the revenue."

"Absolute control by municipalities of their own streets and every encouragement to the ownership and operation of their own utilities."

"Management of the public school system by a head experienced in and conversant with that system."

DOES IT WANT TO BUY. The Tete De Font Barracks Site For Station?

Of late, it has been reported that the Grand Trunk railway company wished to purchase the property on which Tete de Font Barracks stands, so that if its line was brought further into the city, it would have a good site for a station.

Negotiations seem to have been entered into with the militia department, but nothing definite in the matter has been heard. It has been suggested that this has caused the delay in the getting out of the plans for the remodeling of the barracks. However, the plans have now arrived, and tenders will soon be called for, so that if the Grand Trunk railway company wish the barracks' site it will have to speak soon.

It was further said that the department intended to concentrate all its barracks at Artillery Park, purchasing the land right up to Queen street and below St. Paul's church.

The White correspondents at Ottawa was wired and in reply he said he was told by Col. Fiatt that the G.T.R. had not purchased the site of the Tete de Font Barracks. The department does not intend to sell the barracks to be erected including one hospital and one gunshed. The intended purchase does not include St. Paul's church.

WIFE AND BABE DEAD. What Dr. Dorsey Has to Tell of An Affair.

Washington, Jan. 30.—Answering a call from W. G. Cooley, a census office clerk, Dr. John S. Dorsey, physician at Langdon, rushed to the man's residence, at midnight, and there found the wife and three-month-old child of the clerk dead, with several bullet wounds in their bodies. Cooley, Dr. Dorsey said, reported his wife had shot herself and the baby, but it is believed to be impossible for the woman to have inflicted on herself the wounds which caused her death.

OFFICERS SHOT. An Eighteen-Year-Old Assassin Has Fled.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—M. Guida, governor of the political prison on Basil Island, a suburb of this city, was shot in the main street of the island, to-day, and died almost instantly.

The assassin, a youth of eighteen, dressed as a woman, also shot and mortally wounded a prison warden who accompanied M. Guida. He disappeared on the shooting.

Fight in Venezuela. Willonstad, Island of Curacao, January 30.—According to advices received here, from Caracas, to-day, Governor Mata, at the head of a body of armed troops, surprised a secret political meeting in the yard of Vice-President Gomez at Caracas, Venezuela, during the night of January 27th, and in the fighting which followed, Governor Mata and several others were killed, and a number, including the commander of the troops, were wounded.

Wife And Child Destitute. A. J. Salmon, a second year medical student of Queen's, has received word from his home in Kingston, Jamaica, that his wife and child were severely injured in the earthquake. Their home was destroyed, and they are high destitute. Mr. Salmon is leaving to-morrow for his home in the far south.

Board Of Trade. There was no meeting of the board of trade, last evening. An informal discussion was to have taken place, but it did not develop. It is expected that Hon. Adam Beck will be here on February 15th to give his address on the Niagara power question. Next Tuesday evening, the board will be addressed by a local speaker.
