**THE BARON'S FRAUDS.**  
He Aided in Doing Up the Government.  
St. Petersburg, Feb. 1.—The senate has sustained the charges that Gen. Baron Fredericks, governor of Nijni-Novgorod, granted illegal favors to Eric Livin, the contractor, in connection with the famine relief, in allowing Livin to fall into heavy arrears in the delivery of grain, while continuing to sanction advances to him of government money. The senate also finds that Fredericks received from Livin a cheque for 25,000 francs which was paid in Paris last September. Baron Fredericks is a member of the imperial household and has had very high standing in Russia.

**Waive Eight-Hour Day.**  
Chicago, Feb. 1.—The engineers on the western railroads have traded an eight-hour work day for a ten per cent. (83,500,000) increase in wages, to take effect today. About 27,000 men, operating locomotives, and thirty-two roads will react by the agreement entered into between the committees, which were in conference for three weeks. With the advance given to the workers a month ago, the railroad corporations now have added approximately \$10,000,000 to their annual pay rolls. This will not be the end, however, for, today, representatives of 50,000 conductors and other trainmen will renew their requests for substantial increases, running into the millions.
