SERMON AT QUEEN'S ON SUNDAY BY REV. PROF. MACNAUGHTON.

Every New Generation Has to Re-Embodiment the Ever-living Christ For Itself—We Must Not Seek Him in the Past.

Rev. Prof. Macnaughton was the speaker at the Sunday afternoon service in Convocation hall, yesterday. He chose for the subject of his remarks II Corinthians, v, 16: "What we see hereafter, know we no man after the flesh; yea, though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet now henceforth know Him no more." It is supposed our Lord gave to his disciples a well laid down set of Christian laws or rules, which they, in turn, handed on down through the generations, and that the Christian church, marked by a healthy and digestive digestion. St. Paul himself gave much of his life up to thought. The truth was that Paul to get all his opponents certainly stood for some portion of the truth, which it would have been too bad for the church to have lost. Paul stood for the Christ spiritual. If we had to depend on Paul for the worldly side of Christ's life we would have a very meagre account thereof. Our conception of the actual life and the gospel come out of the view point of Paul's opponents. Now, if we had to choose between the gospel and Paul's epistles which would we take? For the speaker's part, he would unhesitatingly select the former. Hence it was good that both view points have been retained.

Of what use would it be to us to know the bare outline of Jesus' life if we did not grasp the underlying truth and powers thereof. Of absolutely no use, of course. Simply to try to repeat the past is far from possible, and those who try to do so are lost to those whom they are trying to simulate. Every age must work out its own life. Thus it is just the same with Jesus' life. Palestine in those days was far different from our Canada of to-day. The environments to which Christ had to adapt himself were far from the advancement of our country. It is the Christ that lives on to-day. It's the Christ that lives on to-day, that we are in search of, and then the historical surroundings cannot count for much. It's the Christ that saves Himself, yesterday, to-day, and to-morrow that is of use to us in working out our salvation. A belief in anything but what is deep convinced within us falls far short of being worthy.

Then the question arises, are not the historical details of Christ's life of use? Of course they are, and worth more than all the other literature of the world. In them we find the truth that really matters, the one thing that is needful to us, made clear to us better than anywhere else. There is found the sort of man to whom our hearts go out. Over that world which he had to do Jesus won the victory though the path was rugged and hard. So, we by faith can grasp those forces which lived in Him. Can we gain the victory over our world also. Not by might and force, but by the spirit of the Lord. Not by turning of stone into bread, or walking on water to the light, by following God's word and voice into the darkest places. By faith, love and service. This is then what gives the gospel their enduring worth.

The church is the body of Christ and every new generation has to re-embodiment the ever-living Christ for itself. We can go back and study these old formulas and endeavor to find the underlying spirit of Christ. But our great task is to re-embodiment Him in terms that will be of service for our own life. "Who seek ye the living among the dead?"
