BIG FIRE AT PICTON

THE JAMIESON BLOCK WAS DESTROYED.

The Loss is \$40,000—The Eastern Section of the Business Part of the Town Was in Danger—Those Who Survived.

Picton, Feb. 4.—The Jamieson block, on Main street, one of Picton's finest business places, is in ruins; gutted by a fire which started shortly after midnight, Saturday, and which did about \$40,000 damages. The building, a three-story structure, of brick, was occupied by Cayley & Tanner, dry goods merchants, and A. J. Frailek & Co., gent's furnishes.

Just before closing his shop, H. S. Wilcocks, in the adjoining store, detected the smell of smoke, and on investigation he found the store of Cayley & Tanner's to be on fire. The alarm was at once sounded. Nearly an hour elapsed before the fire brigade got to work, and by then the fire had gained great headway. A strong and bitter winter wind blew, making it a strenuous fight for the volunteer brigade. Their energetic efforts were badly hindered by the freezing of all the apparatus. The building was demolished from the cold. A. E. Wilson, manager of the Bank of Montreal, opposite the burning building, furnished hot coffee to the fire fighters.

For a time it looked as if the entire eastern section of the business part of the town was doomed, but the fire made little headway against a fireproof wall of the Wilcocks grocery, and was well confined to where it originated. At 4 a.m., the fire was out and the firemen went home. At noon, Sunday, a second alarm was rung in, as the building and again spring fire, but an hour's work put it entirely out.

Cayley & Tanner is a new firm in Picton, having bought out Jamieson Bros., about a year ago. Some of the new spring goods had just arrived and was unpacked in the cellar. Mr. Tanner, who, it is said, could not see as yet, estimated his loss. It will likely be about \$15,000, with insurance. Frailek's will lose a \$6,000 stock, covered by insurance, and the building, owned by Jamieson Bros., was valued at about \$15,000, and was insured.

The stock in the two adjoining stores, Wilcocks' grocery and O. B. Frailek's, gent's furnishings, was damaged considerably by smoke and heat.

None of the stock in the burned stores was saved. The fire was one of the most disastrous in the town's history.

While witnessing the fire, J. H. Porter fell on the icy walk and broke a finger.

Among the insurance companies affected are: Alliance, Perth Mutual, London Mutual, Independent Cash Mutual, Hamilton Fire and Traders' Fire and Life.

To Be Ruled From Berlin.
London, Feb. 4.—The Financial News Paris correspondent says a well-informed Canadian friend informed him that the Kaiser's policy aims at the isolation of Britain. Both Canada and Mexico are ultimately destined to be ruled from Berlin.

CONSERVATIVES WIN

VICTORY FOR THE M'BRIDE GOVERNMENT.

Socialist Influence on Provincial Politics Seems Practically at an End.

Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 4.—Latest returns give Premier McBride a following of twenty-six, while the liberals claim fourteen seats, and the socialists two seats. While complete returns may make slight changes in the list it is certain that the conservatives have captured the province by a handsome margin.

Vancouver—Five conservatives elected: W. J. Bowser, R. G. Tatlow, R. H. McGuire, J. F. Garden and A. H. B. McIowan.

Victoria—Four conservatives: Premier McBride, Thomson, Behnen and Davie.

Atlin—Dr. Young (conservative), Alberni—Brewster (liberal).

Cariboo—Two conservatives: Columbia, H. G. Parsons (conservative); Comox, J. R. Grant (conservative); Cranbrook—Dr. King (liberal); Ladysmith—Premier McBride (conservative).

Fernie—W. R. Ross (conservative), 34 majority.

Islands—T. W. Paterson (liberal), Kamloops—Hon. P. J. Fulton (conservative).

Nelson—Dr. Hall (liberal), 5 majority.

Kaslo—McKay (conservative), New Westminster—L. Gifford (conservative).

Richmond—Col. F. Carter Colton, (conservative).

Roseland—J. A. Macdonald (liberal leader), 54 majority.

Similkameen—L. W. Straford (conservative).

Yale—S. Henderson (liberal), Ymir—Schofield (conservative).

Nanaimo—Hawthornthwaite (socialist), 132 majority.

Brekestone—L. Taylor (conservative), majority so far 5.

Greenwood—Naden (liberal), plurality of 27 over labor and socialist.

Grand Forks—Socialist plurality of 67 over Miller (conservative), and Gregory (liberal).

Equipment—Jardine (liberal) defeated Speaker Pooley.

Slocan—Hunter (conservative).

The other seven seats are now yet obtainable, owing to the distance the returning officers have to travel and the severe weather prevailing.

Discussions in the ranks of liberals and socialists helped McBride. In fact, the latter element barely succeeded in capturing two votes, and influencing on provincial politics seems to be practically at an end in the face of the popular rule of the conservative leader.
