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TO MAKE ADVANCES INCREASING FREIGHT RATES ON COMMODITIES.

So as to Make Up For the Advances on Wages to Railway Employees—Eastern Railroads Are Concerned.

Chicago, Feb. 6.—The Record-Herald says the executive officials of the eastern railroads, controlling more than one hundred thousand miles of lines, yesterday, took action to reimburse themselves for the recent increase in the wages of their employees.

A vote is now being taken on the position to increase the rates on nearly all of the manufactured commodities ten per cent, by increasing the minimum, which it is permitted to load into a car. All the roads initially increased their rates on the territory east of this city and north of Ohio, clear to the seaboard and north into Canada.

CATCHING BIRDS IN NETS. Method Employed Along the Coast Lands of England.

In various parts of the country flight nets are set out for a very long way. The nets are stretched along the coast for taking birds during the night, but those that Friskney, on the Wash, in Lincolnshire, have become famous on account of their size and the quantity of birds that are taken in them.

On this particular portion of the coast, says The London Daily Graphic, the nets are set out for a very long way. Next to the big sea bank, which prevents the surrounding country from being flooded, there is a large marsh intersected by a very deep, narrow waterway, which is locally known as sapphire; next to this is a big stretch of sand, and following this a vast mud flat, famous for its cockles. There are several more there who work flight nets.

George Brax, the old wildfowler, has four of the longest, consisting of eleven lengths, each length of net being 38 yards long and about six feet deep, made of fine, strong black cotton twine, with a mesh six inches square. Along the top and bottom of the net runs a strong cord, which is placed at every 37 yards distance. The lower running cord is attached to the pole about two feet from the ground, and there is plenty of slack. If it were placed at its full stretch the birds in striking would often be thrown back and escape, instead of being curled up in a hopeless tangle.

The best time to catch the wildfowl is on what are known as the "darks," that is, dark, stormy nights with high tides, and the wind blowing north and northeast. Quiet moonlight nights are bad, as the birds flying low, see the net and avoid the snare by rising over the top of it. Of course, such a large mesh means that the birds pass through without being caught, and, being of this time, often when a large bunch of ducks or geese strike it, they get clean through the net and a few feathers to tell the tale. The writer has seen various ducks and gulls, woodcock, snipe, plovers, and many other birds caught in the nets. One has to visit the net at daybreak to take out the spoil, otherwise the gulls and grey-backs would eat every short-legged bird that was left.

In netting the ubiquitous and destructive sparrow that is needed in a special sparrow net, pocketed on the house, the birds are gradually downward, the birds, as they are disturbed, fly out into the toils. Several scores of birds may be captured in an evening.

21,787 Die of Snake Bite. The number of persons killed in India in 1906 by wild beasts was 2,054, as against 2,157 in the previous year.

A feature of the 1906 returns is the increase in the number of persons killed by wolves in and cattle, attributed to leopards. It is suggested by a writer in Bailey's Magazine that these beasts seek their prey more readily than they used to do in the neighborhood of villages. The fact that more licenses to possess firearms were held in 1905 than in the previous year may be noticed, but it has long been recognized that it is impossible to discover any relation between the number of firearms in native hands and the number of deaths from wild beasts.

During 1905 more dangerous wild beasts were killed than in 1904. The official figures are: Tigers, 1,355; leopards, 4,811; bears, 2,238; wolves, 2,016; and hyenas, 554. Well known man-eating tigers. A regular crusade against wolves has been carried on in parts of the Central Provinces where these beasts are most numerous and most troublesome.

To the success of the campaign no doubt may be attributed the great decrease in the number of persons killed by wolves in 1904. In 1905 only 118. Before dismissing this subject it is worth noting that the Bengal Government in September last offered a special reward of Rs. 500 for a man-eating tiger which killed seven persons last year in Goulkera Forest, Singhbhum district. The ordinary reward for a tiger is Rs. 40.

HOW IT STANDS.

The United States Beet Sugar Industry.

New York, Feb. 6.—Though a comparatively new industry in the United States, the manufacture of sugar from beets has progressed at a very rapid rate during the past four years. In 1900 there were thirty establishments engaged in the manufacture of beet sugar, while in 1905 there were fifty-one, an increase of seventy per cent. Their capital in 1905 was \$55,923,159, as compared with \$20,719 in 1900.

The average number of wage-earners was 3,965, as compared with 1,370 in 1900. The expense of running these establishments shows an increase of 253 per cent, while the cost of material used increased from \$7,323,857 in 1900 to \$21,333,000 in 1905. The value of products shows an increase of 133 per cent, or from \$7,323,857 in 1900 to \$21,333,000 in 1905.

The number of establishments, nineteen being in that state, with a daily capacity of 12,550 tons, while the second largest beet sugar state is Colorado, with nine establishments.

FASHION'S FORM. Gown of Black Accordion Plaited Crepe.

ALL YOUNG CRIMINALS. Marseilles at Mercy of Daring Thieves.

Marseilles, Feb. 5.—Highway robbers infest the streets here, and are becoming more daring every day. Marie Savon, the wife of a well-known merchant, was robbed of her earrings in a busy street here yesterday evening.

Another woman, Miss Anquet, has been victimized in the same manner. The robbers work swiftly, and do not hesitate to tear away women's earrings by force. Two or three other women have been similarly robbed.

The neighborhood of the Quai des Anglais is unsafe for passengers. English sailors and steamship passengers are frequently robbed in spite of police vigilance. The thieves "hold up" carriages and run the occupants. If they are not satisfied, the thieves use their revolvers.

The centre of the city is almost as unsafe, and the numerically weak police are unable to remove contraband from the streets. The economy was performed by train in the evening have been set upon and robbed.
