flight nets are used on certain parts of the coast for taking birds during the nighttime, but those at Friskney, become famous on account of their size and the quantity of birds that are taken in them.

New York, Feb. 6.-Though a com ted States, the manufacture of sugar from beets has progressed at a very rapid rate during the past four years. In 1900 there were thirty establish ments engaged in the manufacture of Employees-Eastern Railroads beet sugar, while in 1905 there were fifty-one, an increase of seventy per cent. Their capital in 1905 was \$55, 923,459, as compared with \$20,719 in 1900. The average number of wage earners was 3,963, as compared with 1,970 in 1900. The expense of run ning these establishments shows an increase of 353 per cent., while the cost of material used increased from 84,803,796 in 1900 to \$14,486,876 in 1905. The value of products shows an increase of 233 per cent, or from \$7, 323,857 in 1900 to \$24,393,000 in 1905. Over \$11,000,000 was distributed amongst the farmers in the beet raising districts in payments for beets while over \$2,000,000 was paid for limestone, sulphur, coke and fuel. The fifty-one companies shown by the returns of 1905 were all owned by corporations. Michigan leads the states with the number of establishments. 
