SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS, Any even numbered section of Domiston Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Province, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-agent.

An application for entry or inspection made personally at any Sub-agent's office made be wired to the local Agent by the Sub-agent, at the expense of the applicant, and if the land applied for is application is to have priority and the land will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are

received by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfelt all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received from an individual until that application has been disposed of:

A homesteader whose entry is in good standing and not habe to cancellation, may, subject to approval of bepartment. relinquish it in favour of father, mother, relinquish to the no one else, on filing declaration of abandonment.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled Where an entry is summarily cancelled or voluntarily abandened, subsequent to institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to prior right of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in what particulars the homesteader is in default, and if subsequentry the statement is found to be incorrect in material particulars, the applicant will lose any prior right of re-entry should the land become vacant, or if entry has been land become vacant, or if entry has been land become vacant, or if entry has been land become vacant. granted it may be summarily cancelled.

Duties.—A settler is required to perform the conditions under one of the following plans :- (1) At least six months' residence up year during the term of three years.

(2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for by such homesteader the requirement as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa, of his inten-

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS. Coal.—Coal lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 320 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz.—A free miner's certificate 'is granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$50 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital. A free miner, having discovered mineral in place, may locate a claim 1,500; At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made, and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent provides for the payment of a revealty of \$1 per cent on the sales.

Placer mining claims generally are 100
