COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

That is Going On In the Business World—The Markets.

There are 33,070 miles of railway in Germany.

Germany produced last year 93,000,000 gallons of potatoes, alcohol, largely for automobile use.

The production of the gold mines in Idaho in 1906 was 577,200 ounces as compared with 629,415 ounces the previous year.

The New York Central railway carries forty-three per cent of the freight which crosses the state of New York; the Erie (Grand Central) carries the rest.

The annual report of the Western Union Telegraph company shows 40,000,000 messages transmitted, \$29,000,000 earned; net revenue \$8,000,000, and a surplus of \$13,000,000.

The number of vessels launched during the year at Aberdeen was 55, with a gross tonnage of 10,019, compared with 59 vessels of 9,452 gross tonnage last year. By far the larger number of vessels launched have been trawlers. The prospects for the coming year are fairly bright.

United States Steel Corporation will begin to reach the market in 1904. In that year the Steel Corporation showed a production of 6,792,780 tons of rolled and other finished products for sale in 1904 was considerably above 10,000,000 tons.

The newspapers report that steps are being taken to roll and other finished products for sale. This figure compares with 6,792,780 tons in 1903. It is estimated that the aggregate production of all the plants going into the new concern will be the output of worth at least \$10,000,000 annually. The company will employ some 5,000 men and a total of 30,000 in the United States.

MRS. THAW ON STAND

SHE TELLS THE STORY OF HER STRANGE LIFE.

Mr. Jerome Will Bring Six Chorus Girls to Refute Her Evidence—Howard Thaw Will Refute Attacks on White's Character.

New York, Feb. 5.—Although Evelyn Nesbit Thaw was on the witness stand nearly all of yesterday's session she had no narrative down only to the time, when, after repeatedly refusing to marry Thaw, she had returned to the stage. This was in 1903. Today she took up the story where she left off. That Attorney Delmas will attempt to take up the entire day with direct examination is generally the opinion. If he can do it he will be left for their two holidays with the story of the young wife married by cross-examination in their minds, and Mrs. Thaw will have two days to rest before the prosecution seeks to break down the favorable testimony developed by the defense.

District Attorney Jerome has summoned half a dozen of the young chorus beauties, former companions of Mrs. Thaw, to testify. Through these women, all actresses, he hopes to refute Mrs. Thaw's narrative of certain incidents of her career when she was a child. He will try to break down her dramatic tale of the events that took place in the architect's studio. It is well known that young Howard Nesbit has sworn that he would refute any attack upon character of Sanford White.

Mrs. Thaw was examined regarding certain letters written to Attorney Longfellow, by H. K. Thaw, which were put in evidence. She told of going to B. E. Hummel's office with Sanford White. She said the lawyer put in a paper, "A lot of stuff about my being carried off by Harry Thaw against my will and a lot of stuff that wasn't true. I started to interrupt, but he would not let me explain. I said I absolutely nothing in Mr. Hummel's office," added Mrs. Thaw. She said Harry accused her of having improper relations with White after he returned from Europe. "I said it was a lie, I had not," she declared.

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 5.—For some time the street railway officials have suspected the company was not getting all the fares that were put into the conductors' fare boxes, and a couple of private detectives were employed to find out where the money was going. Last night Joseph Piper, a motorman, was caught in the act of extracting fares from the box by means of a digger, and was placed under arrest.
