URGE CITY COUNCIL

TO RE-ENGAGE CITY MARKET CLERK McCAMMON.

City Property Committee Unanimously on This Question—Better Electric Service For the City Buildings.

The city property committee met at three o'clock, yesterday afternoon. Present were: Aids, Angrove (chairman), Graham, Free and Douglas. The chairman stated that the only way of being able to properly light the city buildings' tower clock by electricity would be by installing a main feeder in the cellar of the buildings, to supply all needs. The scheme decided upon last December is unsatisfactory to the light department. The latter would put in the feeder at its own expense. The property committee would have to pay for the branches from it.

Ald. Free said that it was time the city clock was lighted properly at night. The gas was giving miserable service to the tower at present. Ald. Graham advocated a short delay and having the whole building properly wired. This would be cheaper than putting in connections by piecemeal.

On motion of Ald. Douglas, the committee instructed the city engineer to call for tenders for wiring the council chamber, entrances and city clock.

Ald. Free brought up the question of market clerk. He thought the city should have such an official, as it had all along until last summer. Many ratepayers had approached him in regard to the matter, and they held the same view as he did. He held that a man who knew something about meat should be on the market in the city's interest. An assistant sanitary inspector was needed when Assessor Gordon was on his assessment rounds. The market clerk could act as assistant sanitary inspector as well as city bailliff.

Ald. Douglas also favored the re-engaging of a market clerk. There was much dissatisfaction with the present conditions.

Chairman Angrove said he was strongly in favor of a market clerk. The council should appoint one at once. The city solicitor, he said, was at present framing a by-law defining the duties of market clerk.

Ald. Graham intimated that he also was in favor of having a market clerk, who could be employed in various other civic duties. Besides acting as assistant sanitary inspector and bailliff, a market clerk could be utilized in delivering water works and light accounts. William McCammon, he said, was the proper man to appoint. He had given good service to the city in the past.

Ald. Free moved that the committee recommend to council that a market clerk be appointed. The motion was passed unanimously.

The chairman said that the chief things required by the city buildings at present was pointing outside and heating. Whatever scheme of renovation the east wing was decided upon, the fullest information would have to be secured by the committee's not again refer back the committee's report for more details. The chairman said it would cost perhaps \$300 to paint the front of the buildings and repair the roof. These were the first things that required to be done.

THE FIRE COMMITTEE

MAKES AN EXTENSION OF FIRE LIMITS.

Electric Light For Wade's Lane—Large Bill For Extra Lighting Last Year When the Moon Was Not in View.

At the meeting of the fire and light committee yesterday afternoon, were Aldermen Ross (chairman), Nicks, Graham, Angrove, Millan, Robertson and Hinderson.

City Solicitor McIntyre was present in connection with the fire limits, which it was thought advisable to extend. He thought that only solid brick and stone should be allowed within the area bounded by Clarence, Wellington and West streets and the water's edge. The committee agreed that the limits should be so increased. The object of this is to give every protection to the locomotive works, foundry and waterworks pump-house.

The bill of the light department for extra lighting, outside of the moon schedule last quarter, was \$389. Alderman Nicks, who had the honor of presenting this extra lighting, and it was decided not to pay the amount until a detailed statement had been presented. Ald. Graham wanted to know if the city was giving any allowance for lights that failed to burn. Were such lights reported? Ald. Ross said that in most cases the police reported the lights out, and credit for the same was allowed by the department.

Ald. Graham moved that the petition for a light in Wade's Lane be granted. Ald. Nicks thought it would be better if the whole lighting question was taken up. Many more lights were required. He knew that Wade's Lane was a dark place, and it should certainly be lighted. However, perhaps an incandescent light for that place would be sufficient. Ald. Graham moved that an incandescent light of thirty-two candle-power be erected. This the committee agreed to.

Ald. Angrove moved that Simmons Bros. be asked to supply at once the hose they contracted for in December. The department must have it as the city might have a visit from the firefighters' association at any time. It seems that Simmons Bros. contracted to supply 250 feet of Peerless hose at 74 cents a foot. The price at which the company require their agents to sell their hose is eighty cents a foot. At the time the contract was given, Ald. Angrove declared that Simmons Bros. would be unable to supply the hose at the price they quoted. The hose has not yet been delivered, though Simmons Bros. stated they expected to have it in a few days.



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
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
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
