CUT OFF THREE

The Action Of The City Council.

LAST NIGHT'S WORK

THE TAVERN LICENSE QUES-TION IS DISPOSED OF.

The City Council Had the Matter Under Review—Opposition to the Reduction—Wish of the People Carried Out to Some Extent.

By a vote of 14 to 8 the city council, at its meeting last evening, decided to ask the liquor license commissioners to reduce the number of tavern licenses. The bill to do this was introduced by Ald. Ross and a by-law was passed to this effect.

There was a lengthy discussion upon the report of the finance committee recommending a reduction of three licenses, the objection being raised that the city could not afford financially to do so.

However, the vote of the people a month ago in favor of reducing the liquor license had been taken and it could not be ignored.

Finance committee representatives said they had considered the financial aspect of the matter most carefully, and were prepared to support a reduction of three.

Mayor Mowat intimated that personally he was opposed to reducing the licenses, but as the people had voted a reduction he would carry out their wishes.

Ald. Gaskin said that there were many households to the point—if the mover and seconder of the amendment had moved to reduce the licenses by ten or by five than to come out and say that there should be no reduction. The amendment they moved showed that they were hedging. There seemed to be a tendency to shrink the question and then to turn it over to the finance committee.

Ald. Ross said that while the people had voted to reduce the licenses he did not think there were several points that deserved special mention.

Several things had occurred since the vote that were not taken into consideration.

There was, first, the breakwater damage to repair, and that would cost much money.

Further, it had been reached by the Citizens League that the city should not cut off all the licenses, but this was not found to be so.

Then it was unfair to cut off license holders with only six months notice.

At least a year's time should be given.

Ald. Ross took the stand that the city could not afford to lose \$750 by license reduction.

Financial Demands.

Ald. Carson said that while the people voted for a reduction certain things had cropped up since that neither the aldermen nor the people knew of before.

He quoted the extra demands upon the city's revenue this year, viz., the reconstruction of the breakwater, the appointment of a master mariner, the payment of a \$1,000 fine to the O'Kill street sewer, the attention to Queen street sewer, the increases of salaries, the increase of funds necessary for school purposes.

Ald. Carson said that the matter should go back to the finance committee. He did not think that the cutting off of some licenses would decrease the drinking habits of the people, but that the reduction, as far as he was concerned, had gone into the matter thoroughly, but had decided that they could afford to reduce the number of licenses by three.

Ald. McCann said the finance committee had taken into full consideration the financial aspect, and what the reduction of licenses would be.

Last year there was an appropriation made of the board of works' surplus funds to the fire department.

It would move, if the reduction passed, and have the amount (\$800 or \$1,000) placed in the general funds where it properly belonged. This would offset the loss in license reduction. Ald. McCann said he could not vote against the recommendation of the finance committee.

Recommendation Quite Fair.

Ald. Gaskin claimed that a committee should not bring in such a report unless all the aldermen knew of it before it was introduced.

He opposed license reduction on financial grounds.

The streets needed repairing badly, and as chairman of the board of works, he didn't want to be a stool-pigeon, with no money to put the streets in repair.

He must have money for the streets.

Ald. Gaskin claimed that the O'Kill street sewer was in a bad condition.

Then there was \$600 to be spent by the city solicitor for consolidating the express and telephone lines.

DRIVES LOCOMOTIVE.

Grand Leads Ordinary Life of Fellow-Workmen.

San Sebastian, Feb. 12.—The young Duke of Zaragoza, a grandee of Spain, is to be married to a carriage driving expert from Madrid to the French frontier. Duke de Zaragoza used to do the same thing last summer, but the fact did not become known until the last few days owing to a match announced between the express and motorcycle to be ridden by Senor Heredia.

People Must Be Obeded.

Ald. Angrove said that it seemed strange that Alds. Gaskin, Carson and Ross did not have an eye to the city's financial condition before this.

Why didn't they look into the question before? The speaker had his own private opinion as to license reduction, but he was compelled to oppose it, as the matter, and so far as he was concerned, he was going to fulfil the duty that the people had sent him to the council to do. He claimed that the financial excuses offered were very paltry. The finance committee was completely unable to judge of the matter and had looked into it carefully and given their decision. Then why refer the matter back?
