**OLD LONDON LETTER**

**MISS EMILY TALBOT THE WEALTHIEST LADY.**

**Almost Riot Among Society People at Royal Academy Because Supply of Catalogues Ran Out—Blind Man Wants to Climb Mount Blanc.**

London, Feb. 9.—The death of Lady Burdett Gustav, has left the position of Britain's wealthiest woman to Miss Emily Charlotte Talbot, an elderly spinster, who is hardly known outside Wales, where she owns two magnificent estates. Miss Talbot inherited from her father, Christopher Talbot, M.P., all his real estate in Wales, which is worth \$7,500,000, and a reversionary interest in a huge trust fund. She lives very quietly on her Welsh property, rarely visiting her London house, and dispenses charity in a splendid manner.

More prominent socially, is Miss Alice de Rothschild, cousin of Lord Rothschild, and heiress to her brother, Baron Ferdinand. She owns Waddesdon manor, the finest of the Rothschild homes. She is very charitable, and her great hobby is gardening. In Waddesdon and at Granby, France, where she has a villa, her gardens are famous, seventy gardeners being employed at Granby alone.

Miss Rothschild is able to dispose of her brother's fortune exactly as she pleases, but she will most probably leave it to her own family.

Princess Marie Bonaparte, daughter of the late Prince Roland Bonaparte, inherited a vast fortune from her maternal grandfather, the late Edmond Blanc—Monte Carlo Blanc. She is twenty-five, pretty and accomplished, and although not affianced so far, is very likely to find a husband among the royalties of Europe. Princess Marie has also gone to the States, where she has a villa, her gardens are famous, seventy gardeners being employed at Granby alone.

Miss Rothschild is able to dispose of her brother's fortune exactly as she pleases, but she will most probably leave it to her own family.

Although quite blind, a man mentioned by the Bishop of London, is ambitious to climb Mount Blanc and to cycle round the world. The bishop speaking at the annual festival of the Royal Naval College for the blind at Northwood, London, said he had received a letter from this dauntless blind man, who was a former student at the college. His training there he wrote, had been so helpful that he was able to walk about London unattended and to take a daily cycle ride. His ambitions were apparently impossible feats for a blind man—the ascent of Mont Blanc, and a cycling tour of the world.

Acclaimed in America and Europe as the best-dressed actor, M. LeBarry, of the Comedie Francaise, has given his own view on the matter. He is making his first visit to London for fourteen years, although his wife, from whom he is seeking a divorce, acted with George Alexander, at the St. James Theatre, about three years ago.

"I think," said the great Parisian actor, "that possibly Englishmen dress better than Frenchmen, but the difference is slight, even though nowadays in Paris, English fashions are not followed. Our standards are the same, that is all."

"As for myself, the matter does not interest me greatly. I have been told here that I possess a universal reputation for elegance." (Here M. LeBarry laughed heartily.) "It is a terrible thing to support; a serious thing to live up to."

London has had amateur pantomime acted by society, and mounted gorgeously at great expense.

At the other end of the scale is the pantomime written by the vicar of St. Saviour's, a poor city parish, and acted by children from the worst London slums.

The Rev. E. Rogers, author and producer of the pantomime, described "The Demon King's Capture," as probably the cheapest pantomime ever publicly performed. London slum children, he says are particularly quick in learning, but soon forget what they have learnt. He allowed Mr. Rogers, who thinks that acting plays is a better way of educating children than the ordinary method, is writing a farce for production by members of the parish boys' club.

**LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY.**

It Was Honored at Many Points.

Washington, Feb. 12.—The memory of Abraham Lincoln was honored, today, in the capital with appropriate ceremonies. All the big business houses and many private residences throughout the city are appropriately decorated while the nation's flags are flying from the White House.

Baltimore, Feb. 12.—The Lincoln day banquet, to be held in the 4th Regiment armory, here, tonight, promises to be the most important of its kind ever held in the country since the death of Lincoln. Amongst the speakers will be Vice-President Fairbanks, Secretary of the Treasury Shaw, Attorney-General Bonaparte, Senator Scott, of West Virginia; Senator Dillingham, of Vermont; Senator Warner, of Missouri; Senator Hanes, of Indiana; Senator Spooner, of Wisconsin; Congressman J. Adam Peck, of Minnesota; Theodore E. Burton, of Ohio; Peares, Mudd and Watcher, of Maryland. The banquet is being held under the auspices of the Young Men's Republican Club and the Lincoln League, here. Frank Supplies will be the toastmaster.

Chicago, Feb. 12.—Banks, the board of trade, the Stock Exchange, courts and other public institutions were closed here, today, in honor of Lincoln's birthday. The chief event of the day's exercises was the public memorial meeting in the G.A.R. Memorial Hall Association. Various Grand Army posts, as well as other organizations, held commemorative meetings in the city.

Brooklyn, N.Y., Feb. 12.—At the annual banquet of the Lincoln Club a portrait, by Benjamin Eggleston, of Atlanta, Ga.; Townsend Scudder, justice of the supreme court, and other distinguished speakers will be present.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 12.—Lincoln's birthday was observed by exercises at Lincoln's tomb, in Oak Ridge cemetery, where thousands of people assembled. The exercises were under the auspices of Stephen Post, G.A.R., and Stephenson Women's Relief Corps. Several eulogistic speeches were delivered. Numbers of floral offerings were placed on the sarcophagus from all parts of the country.

New York, Feb. 12.—The Lincoln anniversary was duly observed here. All banks and public buildings are closed since noon and the leading places of business are decorated. The Lincoln banquet will be held in Delmonico's tonight. A number of prominent men will speak.
