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

A deplorable disaster to the fall migration passing over Lake Huron had a slight measure of compensation in the light it threw on the courses of the victims. In the second week in October last there was an unusual fall of temperature, accompantario. Their feathers may have be may have lost their sense of direction or elevation in the impenetrable

The result of the calamity was a clear as the cause was mysterious Along the Lambton shore at the southeastern end of Lake Huron the victims were found in thousands. I week after the storm the extent of the disaster was discovered, and Mr. W. E. Saunders of London made a careful investigation. A census of 1,-845 birds revealed a nondescript com pany of twenty-six species, from flickers, sapsuckers, robins, rusty blackbirds, and saw-whet owls down to ruby-crowned kinglets, of which there were fifteen. There was one yellow rail. The sparrow family was well represented, and the juncoes led with 417 specimens. There were also some thrushes, and vircos. This census covered only a small part of the disaster, for the birds were strewn along some ten miles of shore visited, and justified an estimate of about one thousand to the mile. After an interval of comparative scarcity the shore was reported strewn still more thickly for another stretch of from three to ten miles. This disaster shows that great flocks of birds traverse Lake Huron in preference to overland modifies many established views as to the courses of the migrants, and it has come in a way that should awaken general sympathy and strengthen the impulse to spare and protect.
