Shipments of ore for Cobalt for the week ending February 9th, were about 200 tons.

Toronto Railway earnings for the week ended February 9th totalled \$58,558.04 or \$6,877.06 more than in the corresponding week last year.

Mr. John S. Price, M.L.A., Montreal, was elected president of the Union Bank to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Andrew Thompson.

The Bank of British North America announces a dividend of 30c and 10c, amounting to 40c per share, per share, transferring \$20,000 to reserve, \$20,000 to premium account, and carrying forward \$12,000.

Providence, R.I., Feb. 15.—By the identification, last night, of Bernard Hollingsworth, of Jamaica, a colored waiter, the number of identified dead, in the Larchmont horror, is fifty-five, this morning. The death, last night, of Samuel Lacombe, of Manchester, N.H., one of the persons who reached shore after the Larchmont went down, brought the list of survivors known to eighteen. It is now practically certain the Larchmont carried out with her, on that fatal Monday night, 150 souls.

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WOMAN ACCUSER

BEGGED IN VAIN TO BE ADMITTED.

Her Life Saved By Wreckage—Plenty of Room in Craft, She Charges—Only Six Persons on Board.

Block Island, R.I., Feb. 15.—One more grim harvest of twenty-three victims of the disaster to the ill-fated steamer Larchmont, which the intrepid Block Island fishermen gathered Wednesday, in nearby waters, was sent to the mainland on Thursday.

And as the death-laden boat left for Providence the corpse of yet another victim was brought in by the fishing schooner Theresa, making in all seventy-four bodies that have been recovered from the calamity of Watch Hill, Monday night.

The steamer Kentucky carried away forty-nine bodies, as well as eighteen survivors. The tug Roger Williams, from Providence, steamed back with twenty-three rigid forms on her deck.

The body of Harry Eckels, a resident of this island, will be buried here, while that of an unknown negro waiter, which was brought in just before dark, will probably be sent to the mainland.

One survivor, Miss Sadie Golub, Boston, still remains on the island, where she is being cared for at the home of George Milliken. She told several of the newspaper men that when she begged either Capt. McVey or Purse Young to take her in their boat, they pushed her back and the lifeboat left the Larchmont with only six in it, although it would have held twenty more.

When the steamer went down she found herself on a piece of wreckage and remained on it until picked up ten hours later, by the crew of the fishing schooner Elsie, Miss Golub was very emphatic in her charge against Capt. McVey and the officers of the Larchmont.

Miss Golub, who has remained unconscious since being brought ashore, regained her senses, yesterday, and was very eager to make a statement. It was impossible to take her to Providence with the other survivors, but it was stated that she will recover, although her hands and feet are badly frostbitten.

The body of the negro has a wound in the throat which has the appearance of having been made by a knife. It was thought that it might have been inflicted by one of the fishermen when he hauled the body to the boat with a haul hook, but it was then pointed out that such a wound would not have caused any blood to flow. There were traces of blood about the wound.

It is the general opinion that the unfortunate took his own life after falling in a desperate effort to put on a life preserver found covering his head and one arm.

Two vandals of young people, from the city, drove to Sunbury, to the home of A. Webb, where the evening was enjoyed in games, music, etc. They all sat down to table at two o'clock, and at four o'clock they started for home, arriving in the city at six o'clock, having spent a very pleasant time.

The discoverer of the beneficial properties of Egg Harbor Creek was an old man called Father Smith. He has been using its water for several years, and says he is growing young in consequence. In a little house on the banks, he lives with a number of people who are called his disciples. Men and women who have heard of the creek and have come here to see if it will cure them. There is a story about Boyne river that an old man crippled with rheumatism accidentally fell into it. Up to that time he had been compelled to walk on crutches, but next day, felt so much better, threw away the crutches and has not needed them since. He told his neighbors of his experience, and they did not believe it until several of them went in bathing in the river and claimed that it also cured them of rheumatism.

After the meeting, the board of trade will tender Mr. Beck a banquet in the British-American Hotel.

There are no charges to be made before the court tomorrow, and it is understood that the hotelman will plead guilty to the charge.
