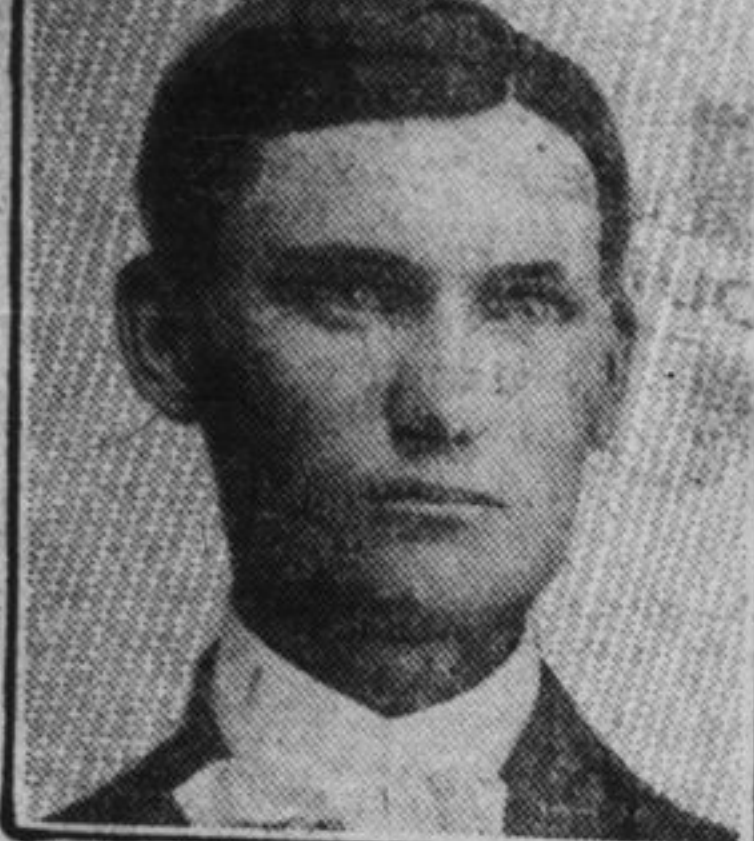

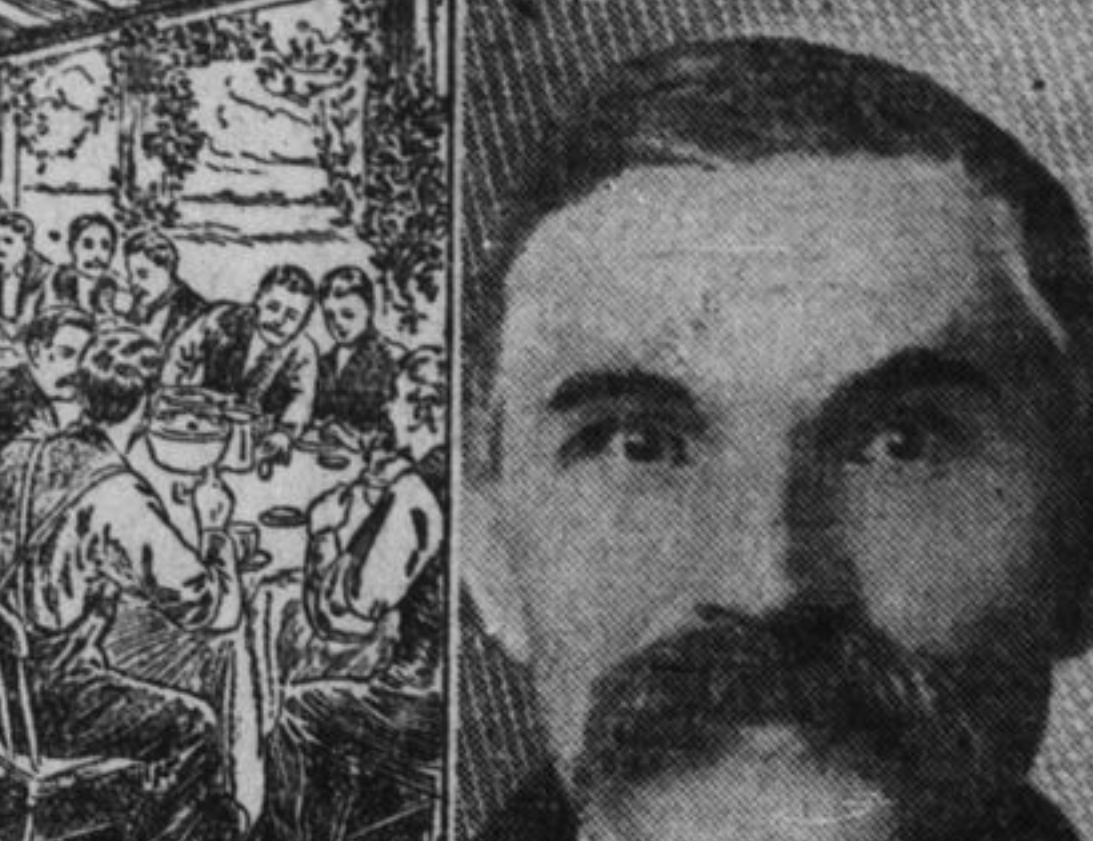

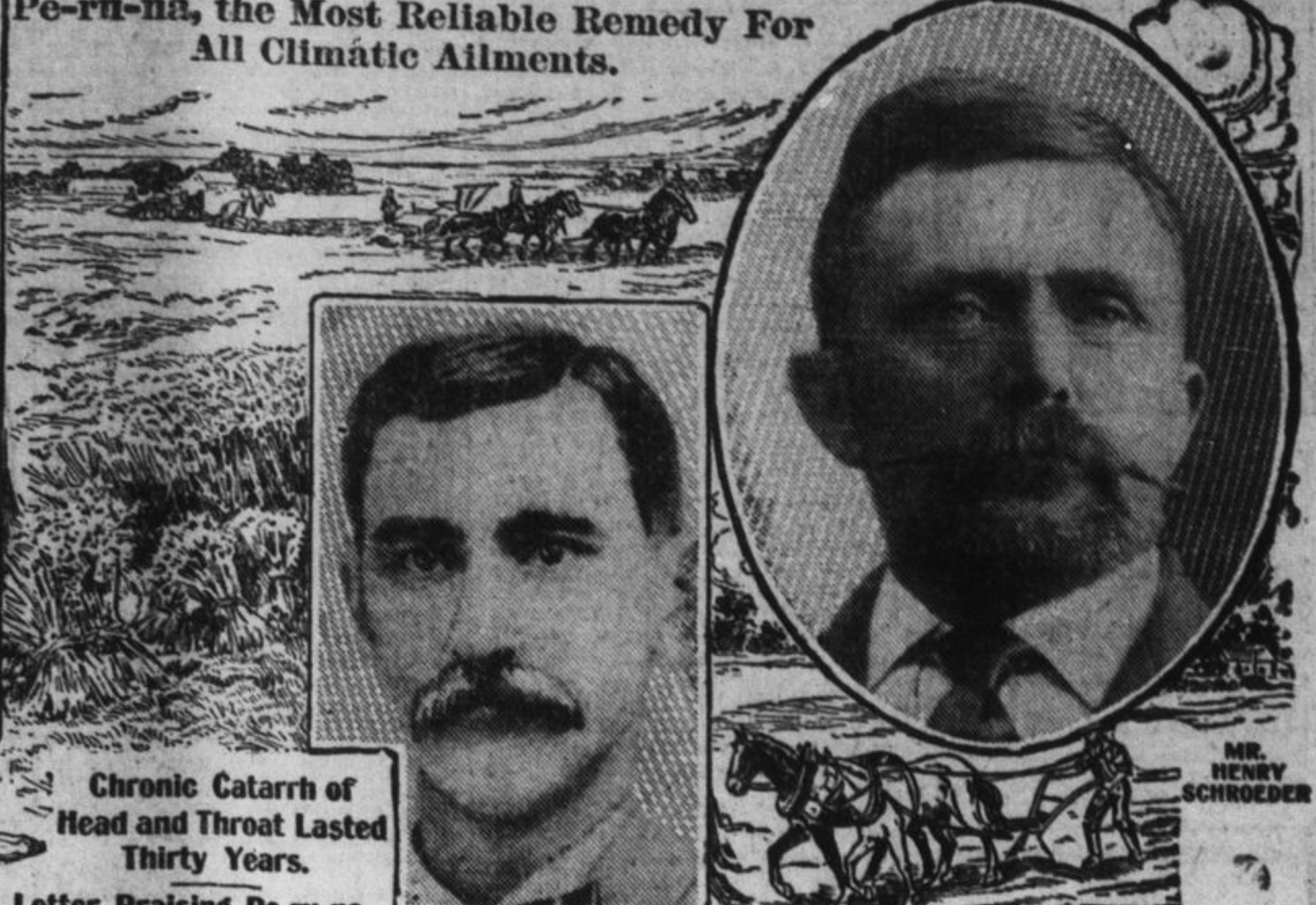

SCHOOLS CLOSED

For the Want of Teachers—A Bad Outlook. Deert Lake, Feb. 14.—Farmers in this locality are busy hauling logs to J. L. Babcock's saw mill. Roads and lanes are especially good. A strange disease, resulting in death to a number of valuable farm dogs, has visited this locality. The disease affects the head and throat, and in a few days the animal becomes helpless and dies. There seems to be no cure for it. The Richardson sparrows have laid in a good supply of wool for next summer's use. James Wilson, Jr., ill for some time, is not improving. The doors of three schools in this locality are still closed on account of want of teachers. This covers a distance of about twenty miles in a block, from Sutherland to Ferryport. If this state of affairs continues the next generation will require an open vote; the doctors will not be able to read the names of the candidates on the ballot paper. Maybe the present government intends keeping the matter of education in the dark. What is said to be the final survey of the Canadian Northern railway through here is finished and an excellent route selected, which will greatly help the mining of different kinds of minerals along the line.
