Nesbitt recognized them as the two lads who had been given shelter at the station a week or so ago, and as complaints had been made about the lads, a charge of vagrancy was lodged against them. The boys were

allowed to stay at the station over night, but were very much surprised when they were not given their liberty Sunday morning. They were told the nature of the charge made against them, and contented themselves as best they could, all day Sunday.

According to their own stories, the boys have been rambling around all parts of the country, but very little truth is put in some of their statements. The Cochran boy says that his father and mother are both dead. He told the officers that his father was killed in a railway accident, last March. Shilling also stated that his parents were dead, but on another occasion, denied this statement. The police know very little about the lads as yet, apart from the fact that they were leading about the city for about a week.

It is stated that the boys were taken in at the House of Providence, but they ran away from this institution. The elder boy says that he endeavored to be taken on the staff at Tete de Pont barracks, but that was refused, he, of course, being too young. However, none of the stories told by the boys are to be believed.

The lads will be arraigned before Magistrate Barrett on a charge of vagrancy, and it is probable that an effort will be made to ascertain something about them, from Montreal. They are looked upon as "tough youngsters," who have had considerable "knocking about," as it were.

A FINE CARNIVAL. Was a Fine Event at Napanee on Thursday.

Napanee, Feb. 18.—One of the best carnivals that has taken place in Napanee for many years was held last Thursday evening, on the Diamond Taylor skating rink. The maskers numbered about 100, the costumes were novel and well represented, and they made a gay and bright appearance on the ice. The night was fair, and ideal for open air skating, the attendance was good. The Napanee band played their choicest pieces. The prize winners were: Bo Pesp, Miss Shaver, won the special prize of Dolly Varden shoes, presented by Mr. Curry; A French Cavalier, Mr. Benle, gent's prize; Minnehaha, Grace Ward, girl's prize; Mohawk Chief, Charles Fitzpatrick, boy's prize; Judge, G. Hartley, Peterboro; G. Graham, Ottawa; Thomas Whelan, who died in Wallace, Idaho, a week ago, took place, yesterday afternoon, from the residence of her daughter, Mrs. P. Gleason, East street, at two o'clock. A large number of friends of deceased were in attendance to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed. Her son, Thomas, of Fernie, accompanied the remains. The deceased lady was highly respected by a large circle of friends in Napanee. The remains were placed in the Roman Catholic cemetery vault.

On Thursday last William Thomas, Dundas street, one of the oldest and most respected residents of Napanee, died after but a short illness, aged eighty-six years. Besides his wife three children are left to mourn. They are: Edward W. Thomas, of Chilliwack, B.C.; Mrs. De Witt, of Calgary, and Frank B. Thomas, of Montreal. The funeral took place yesterday afternoon at two o'clock to Morten vault for interment in the family plot.

Caused Death. Binghamton, Feb. 18.—As a result of being scratched by a baton, Howard T. Miller, twenty years old, died at his home in Lestershire. A few days ago he was sitting beside a woman on an electric car, when she turned her head as he happened to have his head leaned toward her, and her baton accidentally scratched him behind his left ear. Nothing was thought of the injury for several days, when the wound began to swell and blood poisoning developed.
