LINKS WITH THE PAST

QUAINT OLD HOUSE WHERE AD-
MIRAL BLAKE WAS BORN.

No Place Has Greater Interest For
Englishmen—Home of the Blakes
In 1908 Typical of Many Occupied
by Merchants of That Day—Has
Becoming Severe Rather Than a
Picturesque Aspect.

Bridgewater, in Somerset, is full of
historic associations. It has more
of greater interest to Englishmen,
however, than the quaint old house
in which the great Admiral Robert
Blake first saw the light in 1598. The
dwelling, which is a low, rambling
building, has a severe rather than a
picturesque aspect. This, however,
may be taken as rather becoming
than otherwise, when we remember
the great Cromwellian it nurtured and
sheltered. Its square, many-towered
chapel, and low sloping roof, together
with the wide apartments, remain
much the same to-day as when Blake's
family held it.

in business, and was elected for
Parliament for his native town in
1640. Three years later he showed
what soldierly stuff was in him, tak-
ing a prominent part in the defence
of Bristol against the Royalists. Then
he was made lieutenant of Plymouth
regiment, and soon was famous. He
held Lyme against the Royalists, took
and held Taunton against them. His
turn to be a sailor came then. He
was appointed general and admiral
at sea, and his first great feat as such
was the destruction of Prince Rupert's
ships. His victories against Dutch
and Turkish fleets in 1655, and the
Spanish West Indian fleet at San-
ta Cruz in 1657, returning to Eng-
land he died of fever on the way,
and was buried in Westminster Ab-
bey. At the Restoration the body of
this great Englishman was removed
from its resting-place—one of the
meanest reversion ever taken.

Bridgewater still cherishes Blake's
memory, and the house in which he
remains a place of pilgrimage for
all lovers of heroic souls.

Animals Photograph Themselves.

"Photographic views of animals are
obviously quite invaluable to the
zoologist, who cannot possibly study
every species in nature," says the au-
thor. "In the case of wild animals
when immediate observation is es-
pecially difficult for obvious reasons,
the role of photography becomes par-
ticularly important, and the state-
ments of interest that Mr. C. G. Schilling,
the well known African explorer,
should have succeeded in photographing
wild animals returning to their
dens penetrating into the deepest se-
crets of the forests of the dark con-
tinent."

Results in Röntgen Therapy.

Charles Lester Leonard believes that
the Röntgen ray is one of the most
powerful of therapeutic agents. It
should be administered with caution
and only by those who are educated
and competent to observe its physio-
logical action. Experimental studies
have been confirmed by clinical ex-
perience. It has been demonstrated
that this agent acts primarily upon
the lymphatics, destroying them and
localizing the disease, thus prevent-
ing any spread or metastasis. The
rays have been shown to produce a
marked increase in metabolic activ-
ity. They render a very valuable ser-
vice as a palliative agent, lengthen-
ing life and alleviating suffering in
cases of malignant diseases.
