Moving The People Around.
 -Toronto's method of moving the defects in the street railway service to organize a company and propose the construction of an elevated road. This is the movement of a private company, not the movement of the city corporation which is interested primarily in the success of the surface road. There is reason in this. The railway belongs to the city. It is leased to a company for a period of years, under conditions which are not satisfactory.

The revenue side of it is very agreeable. The city enjoys a percentage of the earnings in an ascending scale. At present it amounts to nearly half a million dollars a year. In a sense, this is a good kind of public ownership. The management is private, and on that point more economical, and the benefits are constant, steady and increasing. Why the company hesitates about moving the requirements of the city is beyond our ken. The traffic is enormous, and the profit of it is enormous. Every improvement, especially every improvement which moves the people more expeditiously, adds to the income of the company.

Eventually, the city will have to pay for all these advantages as it contributes to the permeability of the plant, for when the property reverts back to the city an arbitration court will determine the value of it. Under these circumstances the competition of an elevated road would be against the surface road and the revenue it should produce.

It may be that despite the increased facilities which the company or city may provide, the elevated may become a necessity. But that day seems to be a long way off. Toronto, with all its pretensions and it is an airy place—is not a New York or Boston.

Scandal in License Business.
 The evidence which is being laid before the commission is being laid before the Whitney government to inquire into the manner in which the license law is being enforced. In Toronto, it is shocking enough. Mr. Whitney will not admit that the business of the commissioners is being examined, as the request was made by the members of the board for a vindication.

The report so far shows that the Telegram, conservative, had ground for its remarks when it said: "Toronto's license administration has been brought into politics, and the baser elements of the party got its chance to set up a toll-gate and sell influence which they did not possess."

The conservative party alleged that the liberal administration of the license law was not satisfactory. The Whitney combination would relieve the case of a political complexion. It was it did this was remarkable. It discussed the old license board, composed of liberals and conservatives, and appointed in their place boards wholly made up of partisans.

There was a notable exception. In Toronto the new license commissioners, though Tories, were men of exceptional fairness. They had hardly begun their rule when the inspectors were dismissed, and the commissioners regarded this as a partisan move and retired from office.

The result is apparent. The men with a "pull" have been a-buzzing around. The graders have been busy, and in the recklessness of their work, the chairman of the board got a check for \$1,000, without any explanation, but under circumstances which suggested that he was being bribed.

The Whitney government want it to be understood that as soon as the scandal became public it was investigated. No other course was possible. Public opinion demanded some notice to be taken of the rumors that were current, and whatever the result may be Mr. Whitney can lay it to the folly of his surrender to the men who wanted in the license business the very thing he was appalled to condemn.

A Governor Who Governs.
 The political sensation of the day is the demand of Governor Hughes, of New York, for the resignation of Superintendent of Insurance Kehey.

The difficulty about all these appointments is that they are not made discreetly. Mr. Kehey was not selected for office because he had a special fitness, and now that he is installed it has not dawned upon him that he is unequal to the emergencies of the hour.

Mr. Hughes knows all about the in-

conced for the legislative committee which unearthed so much rottenness in connection with it. He was the man who dictated the legislation which aimed at its complete reform. When he became the governor he began the personal examination of the public departments, and what he saw and learned surprised him. The result was a hint that Mr. Kehey be removed from the insurance office, and this hint was made quietly, suggestively, in a way which the average official scenting danger would be glad to accept.

Mr. Kehey is a republican and the party has undertaken to screen and save him. Mr. Hughes, however, means action. He showed this when he called Mr. Kehey to a public audience, and proceeded to question him. The superintendent admitted that he kept about him certain discredited officials, and that this very presence was a menace to public efficiency. He had not made himself familiar with the recommendations of the insurance commission and the requirements of the new law. He had not presumably attended to the elections in connection with the insurance policies, designed to protect the policyholders, but had permitted them to work to a firm of accountants, of whose performance he really knew nothing. He practically admitted that he had failed to rise to the demands of the hour.

Perhaps the people of the great state of New York may be willing to let the public business drift, with only one consideration, and that for party politics. They have elected a man for governor who is going to do his whole duty to the state, and those who know what he has accomplished, fearlessly, courageously, honestly, in a minor office, may surmise what he will essay in the larger responsibilities of the day.

Ross, The Member Elect.
 The West Middlesex election is over, and D. C. Ross, the Liberal, and a son of Senator Ross, is the Member by a substantial majority. This will be a sad disappointment to the government, to its head, and to the contingent of conservative members who invaded the constituency and inveighed against the liberal party.

It was a pitiable plea which the press presented on behalf of the Tory party. Its candidate ought to be elected, was said, as an encouragement to the government in well-doing. Its meritorious acts, however, were insignificant when compared with the acts which were not meritorious.

In the Kingston bye-election the government pleaded for an expression of approval, because the government promised much. In West Middlesex it was on the defensive. In two years it had degenerated and fallen from grace. It was attacked for its defective legislation, its surrender to the spoils system, its deliberate conversion of the license boards into the political machine, its reckless increase of the public expenditure, its perpetuation of the inheritance tax which had been denounced by the same party, in opposition, as a robbery of the dead.

The electors seemed to have sized up the situation very correctly. The opposition was worthy of support, the government of condemnation. The result is one that the people generally will approve and applaud. D. C. Ross showed evidence during the fight of his ability, and is expected to give a good account of himself in the legislature.
