BOERS TO THE FRONT POOR SHOW FOR THE DYSEPPTIC.
WILL HAVE MAJORITY IN THE NEXT PARLIAMENT.

Botha Likely to Be Premier—Sir Richard Solomon Among the Defeated—Progressives Are Doing Fairly Well.
 Johannesburg, Feb. 21.—The election results as far as known indicate that the Boers will have a majority in the next parliament. Eighteen progressive, six nationalist, sixteen Dutch party candidates, one independent and three laborites have been returned.
 The returns from a number of country districts have not yet been announced, but these districts strongly favor the Dutch party. The Dutch party, the nationalists and laborites are allied. It is expected that Gen. Botha will be invited to form a cabinet, and that the new ministry will include Gen. Smuts and Gen. De la Rey.

Sir Richard Solomon, lieutenant-governor of the Transvaal, who has joined the Dutch party, and who is regarded as representing the interests of the British liberal government and the leader of the nationalists, has been defeated at Victoria in the most exciting contest of the election, by Sir Percy Fitzpatrick, the progressive candidate, who is a mining magnate. The progressives are known also as the British party. It is still possible, however, that the Dutch party will ask Sir Richard to accept the premiership, in which event a seat for him will be found.

The defeat of Sir Richard Solomon was entirely unexpected by either side, and altogether the progressives made a better fight than they dared anticipate.
A YOUNG ASTRONOMER.
 He Has Written Works of Much Excellence.
 London, Feb. 21.—Hector McPherson, a Scotch youth, eighteen years old, is known as the "boy astronomer." Twenty months ago he published a book entitled "Astronomers of To-day," and in order to get accurate information he learned the French, German, and Italian languages. His latest book, "A Century's Progress," tells in an easy vein the marvelous progress that has been made in astronomy during the last hundred years. He is a member of several European astronomical societies.
A Comparison.
 Pioneer, Toronto.
 The townships of Leeds and Lansdowne are divided into Rear and Front under separate municipal organizations. Some time ago the Front of Leeds and Lansdowne carried a local option by-law by 411 to 338, a majority of 73. The law has now gone through effective operation that in the recent election, it was sustained by a vote of 512 to 206, a majority of 306.
 The rear part of these townships is not quite so populous, but in the vote on the local option by-law on January 7th last, the roll stood 230 for and 216 against the adoption of the by-law: thus in a much smaller vote, and yet by a much larger majority than first obtained in the Front, the electors of the rear declared themselves for local option, but here the three-fifths requirement acts in, and prevents the benefits that the citizens from the Front have emphatically approved of.

MORMON EMIGRANTS BARRED.
 Swiss Police Department Restricts Exodus.
 Geneva, Feb. 22.—The police department of the cantons of Berne and Thurgau issued warnings advising the people not to emigrate to Salt Lake City.
 Mormon missionaries have obtained many converts, almost exclusively young girls, in these two cantons, and letters which have been received from some of them are now published by the police.
 From these it appears that the girls were tempted away by the most glowing accounts of life in Utah, but that when they arrived and had spent what money they possessed they were turned out on the streets.
 An interpellation on the subject is shortly to be made in the Swiss parliament.

 Napanee, Feb. 22.—On Sunday morning last Mrs. T. G. Carrolan was on the crossing by a horse and knook, while no horses were broken, Mrs. Carrolan is suffering from a fall. Mr. and Mrs. Frank Thomas, Montreal, were in town last week attending the funeral of his father, the late William Thomas. They returned to Montreal on Tuesday. Mrs. (Dr.) James Wilson, formerly Constance Harshaw, arrived home on Monday last. Her husband, Mr. C. W. Wilson, was taken ill on the African coast, of typhoid fever, and they proceeded to the Canary Islands, where his death occurred shortly after Mrs. Wilson's sympathize with her in her sad loss.
 Dr. E. Ming is in Toronto, this week, attending the horticultural meeting held there this week. Frank Williams is able to be around again after five weeks in Toronto. He has been with typhoid fever.
 The house social given by Mrs. H. Vandervoort, in aid of the funds of the choir of St. Vincent's church, will take place on Wednesday evening, Feb. 23rd. It will be held at the home of Mrs. W. K. Bruyn and Mrs. W. S. Herrington are spending the week in Toronto.

BUDAPEST WITHOUT COAL.
Dance in Grip of Ice—Supply Cut Off.
 Budapest, Feb. 22.—A coal famine now exists in Budapest, and unless supplies are received immediately, there will be scarcely a fire in the city in a day or two.
 Intense cold still prevails, and the Danube is ice-bound, so that no supplies can be transported up the river. Hundreds of people clamored for coal round a merchant's office, yesterday, and when he showed them a cartful of coal, they rushed to buy it. The cart, in which a few people were hurt. The police had to be summoned to clear the yard.
 The supply of the state railway is very low, and unless this can be augmented immediately, the trains will have to stop running on several lines.

Wheat Famine In Mexico.
 Mexico City, Feb. 22.—Owing to the great scarcity of wheat all over the country the flour mills are nearly all shut down. During the past month little or no flour has been produced and all the native wheat that remains is being sold at \$8 per 300 pounds. A movement made recently to reduce the duty on foreign wheat until such time, at least, as this year's native crop reaches the market. Last year there was a similar scarcity and the duty was suspended with the result that a great quantity of American wheat was imported. The scarcity is due to the greatly increased consumption of white bread by the Mexican people.

 Light bluish gray broadcloth was used for the model of the costume illustrated. The coat of which was a little double-breasted frock. Flat silk braids in self-tone was used as trimmings along with narrow sateen to match. The little inner vest was bordered in silver and Dresden colors, and a large silver button was used to fasten the front of the coat, smaller buttons to match being used on the cuffs of the three-quarter length sleeve. The skirt was plain and trimmed with braid about the lower part.
