### COMMERCIAL MATTERS.

#### That Is Going On In The Business World—The Markets.

#### AND HE WILL SPEND TIME IN PRISON.

#### FOR SECURING MONEY UNDER FALSE PRETENCES—THE HABIT OF POSING AS MILLIONAIRES MUST CEASE.

#### TORONTO, Feb. 22.—James Victor Hull, alias Blake, a young Englishman, was today sentenced to six months in the Central prison for obtaining \$2 from Oscar Lang, a waiter, and \$10 from Col. Greville Harston, under false pretences. He represented himself as a mining man having a camp on Lake Superior, and had made frequent checks. Hull lived at the Queen's hotel and, to the police, claimed he was the son of an English theatrical manager. This habit of posing as a Cobalt millionaire and then swindling people must be stopped," said the police magistrate in passing sentence.

#### SEEKING A HOLIDAY.

#### THE TERRIBLE ADMITMENTS BY THE YOUNG WIFE.

#### NEW YORK, Feb. 22.—Mrs. Thaw was testifying yesterday, when court adjourned until Monday morning, to-day being Washington's birthday, that she probably will cross-examination will consume no less than one more day. The story of Thursday established, for the purpose of the trial, that Evelyn Nesbit would not break off her relations with a Whitehead, who went abroad. It established the fact that she and Thaw lived together in Europe for three months, in 1903, and later on in 1904, both in this country and in Europe. It developed, also, that Miss Nesbit quarreled with her mother in Europe in 1903, after Thaw had proposed, and that she has never seen her mother since that time, excepting on the day she was married to Thaw.

#### Mrs. Thaw made what was considered perhaps her most damning statement to the defendant when she said that he showed her copies of cablegrams that were being sent to Stamford White from Europe, asking him to intercede with a certain James in London to prevent Mrs. Nesbit from "raising her daughter" Evelyn remaining in the company of Thaw.

#### Mrs. Thaw was also forced to admit that when she and her mother went abroad with Thaw in 1903 they were still drawing upon the bounty of Stamford White. She declared that she had a letter of credit for \$400 which was given to her by Whitehead, who turned over to Thaw.

#### There was still a balance in the Merchant Trust company to her order, but she admitted, "But mamma got all of that," said the witness.
