FIRST OF THE SENIOR O.H.A. FINALS

To Be Played in Kingston Next Friday—The Second in Stratford on March 5th—General Notes on Sports.

The O.H.A. executive have arranged the senior final dates. The first of the matches will be played in Kingston next Friday evening, and the second in Stratford on Tuesday, March 5th.

Peterboro's weak claim for the privilege of playing off with Kingston will come before the O.H.A. executive this evening and will be knocked on the head.

The Toronto World, in discussing the close of the O.H.A. season, says: In ten days time providing there is good ice, the O.H.A. will finish its seventeenth year.

The two teams play here Monday night and while a great game may be expected the margin appears too great to overcome and Stratford should, therefore, qualify for the finals with the 14th Regiment, of Kingston, ten.

For the first time since 1896 the senior O.H.A. finals will be fought out by teams outside of Toronto. A remarkable thing is that in 1896 Queen's, of Kingston and Stratford were in the finals, Queens winning 12 to 3.

In the intermediate series four teams are left, Berlin, Parry Sound, Smith's Falls and the winner of the Collingwood-St. George game, Collingwood has a lead of six goals and look like winners.

With the teams so great a distance apart sudden-death games will be arranged in the semi-finals and maybe in the finals. In case Smith's Falls and Parry Sound should qualify for the finals what a joint the teams would have if they played home-and-home games.

The junior series looks like a fight between the two Midget teams of Stratford and Lindsay. Stratford was 18 to 1 in the semi-finals. Lindsay has a lead of nine goals on Collingwood and this looks a big enough handicap to win.

REV. GEORGE JACKSON'S ABLE DISCOURSE.

Delivered on Sunday Evening in Sydenham Street Methodist Church to a Fine Congregation.

An interesting sermon was preached, last night, in Sydenham Street Methodist church, by Rev. George Jackson, son of Sherbourne Street Methodist church, Toronto.

IMPROVED LIGHTING

OF THE STREETS IS TO BE DISCUSSED.

By Two Civic Committees To-Day—The O'Kill and Queen Street Sewer Extension Questions.

The joint meeting of the fire and light and the light and power committees, this afternoon, is for the purpose of discussing the question of improved and increased street lighting.

At present there are 144 street lights, an increase of twenty-nine in the past two years. There are not actually more street lights than there were, if there is to be a reduction in the lighting rates this coming spring.

The board of works thinks it has found a solution of the O'Kill street sewer extension difficulty in City Engineer Beckwith's plan to lay the extension pipe through a concrete pier 150 feet long.

The Queen street sewer extension is another difficulty. To avoid an action for damages the city will have to see that the nuisance in that slip is abated.
