SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

Any unoccupied section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting S. and 26, not being reserved for any special purpose, is open to the sale of a family or male homestead of 160 acres, or more or less.

Application for homestead entry or inspection must be made in person by the applicant at the office of the local Agent or Sub-Agent.

An application for entry or inspection must be made by the applicant in person at the local Agent or Sub-Agent, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

In case of "personation" the entry will be summarily cancelled and the applicant will forfeit all priority of claim.

An applicant for inspection must be eligible for homestead entry, and only one application for inspection will be received by the local Agent or Sub-Agent, and if the land applied for is vacant on receipt of the telegram such application will be held until the necessary papers to complete the transaction are received by mail.

Where an entry is summarily cancelled voluntarily or by the Minister, the institution of cancellation proceedings, the applicant for inspection will be entitled to priority of entry.

Applicants for inspection must state in their applications the names of all persons claiming an interest in the land, and if the father or mother of the applicant has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirement may be satisfied by residence upon such land.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

Coal—Coal Lands may be purchased at \$10 per acre for soft coal and \$20 for anthracite. Not more than 100 acres can be acquired by one individual or company. Royalty at the rate of ten cents per ton of 2,000 pounds shall be collected on the gross output.

Quartz—Quartz claims shall be granted upon payment in advance of \$5 per annum for an individual, and from \$20 to \$100 per annum for a company according to capital.

A free miner may locate a claim 1,500x1,500 feet.

The fee for recording a claim is \$5.

At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year or paid to the mining recorder in lieu thereof. When \$500 has been expended or paid, the locator may, upon having a survey made and upon complying with other requirements, purchase the land at \$1 per acre.

The patent for the claim shall be a royalty of 25 per cent on the sales of the minerals, and shall be 100 feet square entry fee \$5, renewable yearly.

A free miner may obtain two leases to dredge for gold of five miles each for a term of twenty years, renewable at the discretion of the Minister of the Interior. The lessee shall have a dredge in operation at all times, and shall be liable for the lease for each five miles. Rental \$10 per annum for each mile of river leased. Royalty at the rate of 25 per cent collected on the output after it exceeds \$10,000.

Before making application for patent the settler must give six months' notice in writing to the Commissioner of the Interior.
