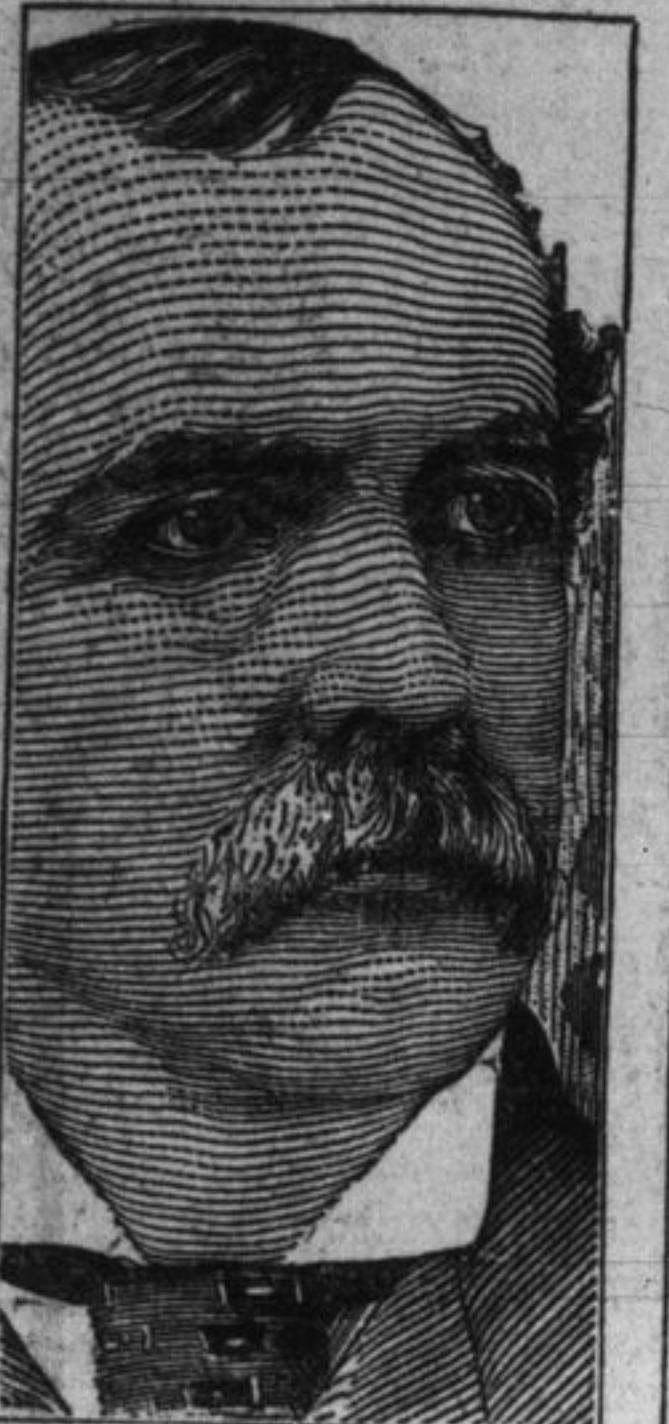

TO ARREST WOMAN

A NURSE WHO MADE WARM CHARGES.

Against Physicians at Port Huron—Said She Was Hurried Off to an Asylum Where She Was Kept Some Time.
Port Huron, Mich., Feb. 27.—A week ago Mrs. Jeanie Alexander, a nurse, whose home is in St. Thomas, Ont., came here and threatened to bring suit for heavy damages against some prominent people, claiming that malicious stories had been circulated by them affecting her character and that when she protested against the reports she was hurried off to an asylum in London, Ont., where she was confined for several weeks. A new turn is now given to the case by the issue of warrants for Miss Alexander's arrest because of the sensational charges made by her against some physicians here. Miss Alexander is well-known here and has been employed by several prominent families.

PRISONERS FOR THE PEN.

Jeremiah Colt Gets Three Years For Theft.
Jeremiah Colt, sentenced at Sault Ste. Marie, to three years in the penitentiary, for theft, was brought to the city yesterday, and is now at the big prison.

Two other prisoners, Frank Keller and Henry Monkton, both young men, hailing from Toronto, are expected at the pen, in the course of a few days. Keller, who is nineteen years of age, was sentenced to three years for attempting to rob Miss Gussie Whimsey, who resides on Dufferin street, Toronto, with violence. Keller has had two convictions for house-breaking. Her death claims, containing \$17.79 from Miss Whimsey, while she was walking on the street, and ran. He was pursued by the plucky young woman, who followed him into a lane. Here she seized the young thief, and he beat her severely about the head. The villain dropped the purse, and Miss Whimsey recovered it. Monkton will also serve three years, he having been found guilty of forgery. Monkton presented a cheque for \$18.25, in favor of James Hill, a Toronto business man, by Stewart & Sons, both names being fictitious. Two other cheques for similar amounts, were negotiated by Monkton.

NEWS OF THE WORLD

OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

In consequence of the receipt of threatening letters, an armed guard has been furnished to the American consulate at Dacca.

A slight earthquake shock was felt at San Francisco, early this morning. No damage resulted, however.

George Barker, a well-known Toronto barber, was run over by a street car, on Friday last, and died this morning.

The officials of the National Starch company, Oswego, contemplate the construction, next summer, of a large power house.

Severely ill persons have broken out in the province of Tonkin, Siam. Troops with five field guns have been sent there.

There is still about \$20,000 needed by the Presbyterian mission funds, which must be made up by February 28th to avoid a deficit.

There will be no big amalgamated city comprising the municipalities of Miss Helen Meek and Fort Arthur. Both will remain separate cities.

Senator Casgrain, Windsor, is seriously ill and small hopes are entertained for his recovery. The senator is eighty-two years old.

The old woman found frozen to death on the Esplanade, at the foot of the Hamilton police admit the recent rumor on quacking joints and hand-books were the work of spotters in the city for some time.

Sylvester Snell, aged seventy-three years, died, on Monday afternoon, at Watertown, Centre, N.Y. He was well known throughout the city as a market gardener.

Edward Ryan, Detroit, Mich., referee of a prize match in which Ward, of Montreal, was killed, will not be tried at Grand Rapids, Mich., this week, owing to illness.

William March, physical instructor at the Y.M.C.A., Montreal, N.B., has invited a large sum of cash and valuable articles, guests at the house where he boarded.

After kissing his three children and bidding his wife good-bye, Andrew J. Schilling, formerly of Oswego, N.Y., shot himself, in Syracuse, N.Y. He is aged thirty-three years and dependent.

Mayor Coatsworth, on behalf of the citizens of Toronto, today, sent a message of sympathy to the mayor of Montreal, in connection with the calamitous fire in the Hochelaga Protestant school.

Col. Samuel Hughes has been elected to the position of adjutant general of the militia. Earl Gray will contribute a \$500 challenge trophy for competition among the cadet corps of the different cities.
