TO BE A LAW SUIT

Over the Insurance Upon a Big Stock. Picton, Feb. 27.—It is understood a lawsuit will be the outcome of the recent big fire when the Jamieson block was destroyed with Cayley and Tanner's, one of the firms whose stock suffered, as plaintiffs and the insurance companies as defendants. It is understood that Cayley and Tanner were offered \$7,500 to cover their loss. This they refused, asking their full insurance of \$15,000. It is said the claim of the insurance companies is not wanting to pay in full is that they assert that Cayley and Tanner at the time of the fire were carrying more insurance than their stock was worth. Against this Cayley and Tanner declared their cellar was stocked with new goods. Toronto lawyers are handling the matter. For some time past many townsfolk have been troubled by a chain letter purporting to have been originally sent out by Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts. Rev. W. L.
