Dublin, Feb. 14.—What was one of the most brilliant pre-Easter balls and receptions was given at the Castle, Tuesday evening by Lord and Lady Aberdeen, viceroy and vicereine of Ireland. The affair was a most delightful one, and as the number was limited to 600, there was no crush, such as hitherto has always been experienced at the first court of the season. The new regulations are modeled on the lines of their majesties' court at Buckingham Palace, with the result that there is infinitely greater comfort both for the vicereine and vicereine and for all their guests. The ladies and gentlemen, as they arrived, were conducted to the long picture gallery, and then in turn were conducted to St. Patrick's Hall, their excellencies were seated on a raised dais, surrounded by their household and members of the house party.

The ordeal of presentation was certainly greater than in the more limited space of the throne room, where the drawing rooms were previously held. But once the ordeal was over, the guests were allowed to remain in the room, seats being provided for all, and they could then comfortably look on while other ladies passed before and made their courtesies.

The house party at the Castle included the secretary of state for Scotland and Lady Marjorie Sinclair, Lord Aberdeen's only daughter; Lord and Lady Kenmare and the Ladies Dorothy and Cecily Browne, Lord and Lady Pirrie, Lady Violet Brabazon, Lady Louisa Langley, Mr. Birrell, the new chief secretary, and Mrs. Birrell; the Hon. Grace Balfour and Lord Shaftesbury, while Lord and Lady Haddo were included in the "staff."

There was a huge attendance at the levee on Tuesday, and just before the function began Mr. Birrell was sworn in at a special meeting of the privy council. Although the weather on Tuesday was cold and wintry, a number of people came to watch the arrivals, and some of the ladies of the house party looked on from the balcony. The commander of the forces, Lord Grenfell, accompanied the Vicereine to the throne room, and the Lord Chancellor and the Archbishop of Dublin were also in evidence.

GOLD-MESH PURSES.

Objects of Personal Adornment in Vogue. London, March 2.—In London and Paris two objects of personal adornment have lately been revived that at former periods enjoyed a favor quite great. One is the serpent, the other gold-mesh purses, which may, without stretching a point, certainly be classed among the gems.

The serpent insinuates itself into necklets, rings and bracelets, its venomous head aught with fiery rubies and balafal emeralds, and in silver as well as gold displays its sinuous creath. Some one's ingenuity in introducing it as the support of gloves worn above the elbows was responsible for its re-appearance in so many other capacities.

The gold-mesh purse that is of the newest order shows a diaper pattern brought about by the clever "plaiting" of platinum, gold and silver. A heavy gold mouth or frame supports the mesh part, which is gathered into it like a bag, and the inner side of the said mouth reveals receptacles for sovereigns, a tiny powder puff and an elegant but lilliputian mirror. Gold box purses are preferred to bags by some elegantes, and one has a cat's head repositure upon it in gold and silver, with brilliant emerald eyes, and round its fluffy neck a ribbon cravat tied in a delicate bow, all made of beautiful rubies.

London, Feb. 28.—In the face of recent advice from the court of Roumania, one has almost to give up hope of the recovery of King Charles, who is suffering from an incurable internal disease which leaves little chance of a prolongation of his prosperous reign. Under these circumstances great regret has been felt at the circulation here of rumors of the unpopularity of the Crown Princess Marie, niece of King Edward and daughter of the late Duke of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha.

The princess, who is a beautiful young woman, has never quite captured the Roumanian people, and though the aged queen, "Carmania Sylvia," has done her best to ensure the feeling against her, it still exists and is growing in intensity. The king, who is one of the most popular sovereigns in Europe, resents the absence of Crown Prince Ferdinand, and at a time when it is felt he should be in attendance on his royal uncle, and this is, unfortunately, the view taken of his absence from Roumania by his future subjects.

In the face of the king's ill-health, his attitude is hardly surprising, more especially as the crown prince and princess, when last visiting England, if they did not absolutely refuse to return home, prolonged their visit and declined either to obey or answer letters and telegrams, or to listen to the remonstrances of his majesty's consulars. This is the only instance in which a princess of the blood royal of England is unpopular in her adopted country. The princess has four children, and her youngest son, Prince Nicholas, whose photograph was recently taken here and is being by the thousand, is considered the handsomest royal child in Europe.
