Women On The Warpath.

A contemporary, discussing the demand of the women of England for the franchise, recommends that they be prevented from assembling in meetings, that who are arrested they be tried privately, and that the campaign against them be carried on until they are tired out.

The freedom of the individual cannot be interfered with. There is no propriety in meetings, in making speeches, and in passing resolutions. All this the women cannot be prevented from doing, and they should depend upon the force of public opinion to influence or effect their use rather than indiscriminate, wild and turbulent raids upon the House of Commons.

Women are very persuasive, generally, and they secure their own way when they are desperately persistent. They mistake the attitude of the legislator, however. He is not the docile and submissive creature that is sometimes called the head of the house and that will grant or concede anything in order to preserve domestic peace.

Some years ago the women of America led in the agitation for political power. When Susan B. Anthony was in her prime (now of sainted memory) the women's suffrage movement was of some account. Then the good sisters of England were indifferent. Some of them professed to be shocked with what their sex essayed in America. Now the women of this continent are comparatively quiet, while the women of the old land are having all sorts of trials and sufferings in relation with the police, in order to demonstrate their power. It is a strange change about and one that cannot be explained.

Give Us Cheap Light.

Ald. Chown is to be thanked for coming out so candidly in his statement regarding the electric light and gas plants. His idea is that the revenues of the department should be made a part of the general revenues, after the city has been given street lighting at actual cost and "the people have been given a first class service of reasonable price." There will not be any surplus for appropriation by the council if the conditions suggested by Ald. Chown are imposed.

Electric light at 12c a kilo-watt, and gas at \$1.50 per thousand feet are not reasonable, and the first thing the department should do is reduce the rates for electricity and gas. In the estimation of some people these should be about two-thirds of what they are at present, and the consumers have been patient, not desiring to rush the committee into any precipitous course.

There will not, we repeat, be any surplus if the people get the cheap service they have promised. It is agreed that allowance should be made for restoration or depreciation, but it is intimated that the city should have the use of this money while it is accumulating. The history of the civic sinking funds is an argument against that proposal. Some municipalities in their extremities, used the sinking fund and to prevent the embarrassment that followed the legislature has favoured the issue of debentures in such a form that payment of them has been made gradually, part interest and part principal each year. If experience were wanting as to the folly of robbing the civic plants for general purposes, in expectation that the money would be laid when required, they are furnished by some of the English cities.

Then envious eyes have been laid on the nest egg which the water department possesses. This, it is said, should go into the city's receipts, and when the new engine, for which money is being saved, is needed, the city can issue bonds for the purpose. Yes? Can the department or the council issue those bonds without the people's consent? And supposing the council laid hands on the little water surplus and spent it, and it was not available when wanted?

The people do not always vote "yes" on money by laws. They occasionally say "no," and they are to be commended for it. The property owners have a horror of public debt, and with all this respect to Ald. Chown, they may not be disposed to add to it. The debt is big enough now. It is not oppressive, and simply because the public utilities are calculated to pay their way. But there should be no trifling with their finances.

Finally the people are urged to discuss the question in all its bearings. That is right, and as a preliminary the expert or manager of the plant should submit a statement and make his recommendations. Respect will be

America And Its Boss.

The America leaders of public opinion, including the editors of the metropolitan press, were amazed, to express it mildly, with the attitude of E. H. Harriman before the state railway commission. Revelations were expected when he was called to the stand, and revelations there were of a more or less startling character. He wanted to work his own story, but the lawyer wanted certain facts, in categorical order, and so insisted upon him answering their questions. This he did, his little eyes snapping and the grin, so characteristic of him, broadening and distorting his face.

Did he admit anything? Certainly. He did not hesitate to tell that he and his associates manipulated the stock market at their own sweet will, that some bonds were sacrificed because they wanted it, that stock was bought at 65 and sold at 90, that the capital of a railroad was increased in a few months from thirty-nine to over an hundred and twenty-two millions, and the difference represented that which some men called "water." On this watered stock dividends from 30 to 80 per cent. were declared, and the people paid them in the ratio it was necessary to charge in order to get the revenue.

Can Congress intervene, and save the transportation facilities of the United States from his monopolistic clutches? The legislators pass laws, but he defies or evades them. Did he do thus and so? I suggest one in authority, and he smilingly answers "yes." In effect he asks, in the language of the immortal Tweed, "What are you going to do about it?"

The World's Work pictures him in a new role, as a political boss. The Southern Pacific, which has so long acknowledged his leadership, assumes to manage California, and in the recent state election Harriman's man, Gillett, was elected governor. Here is the beginning of a new menace, the significance of which is apparent to the political seers across the way.
