NO CONTAGION FOUND.

Cattle Became Ill By Licking Poisonous Powder.

Mr. Higginson, Dominion veterinary inspector, was here from Ottawa in the afternoon, to inspect a case of contagion among cattle beyond Odessa.

In company with local veterinarians, he visited the place, and one of the local doctors, in questioning the farmer, found that he had been rubbing some poisonous powder into the animals' skin to kill creeping things.

The poison went through the system of the cows, and three of them died. There was nothing of a contagious nature found. The remaining cows will get well if the farmer ceases rubbing them with poison. The cows, in licking themselves, took the poison into their system. This should serve as a warning to farmers.

On His Annual Round.

George Buskin, agent and missionary of the International Evangelical and Colportage Mission, is making his twenty-fourth annual visit to Kingston in behalf of disseminating Biblical literature through the northern and western districts of Ontario and as far west as Victoria, British Columbia.

The number of Bibles and books that have been supplied by the mission and taken account of, have numbered 43,200 copies, in twenty-one languages, and as many as ten thousand booklets and tracts have been given, of which eighty editions have been published by the mission for its work in five languages.

Four editions have been published during the past year, in Ojibway, Indian and English. Others necessary in the north are being published among them the second part of the Ojibway Indian dictionary, for which \$600 costs will be incurred to complete the dictionary alone.

The donations of Kingston in behalf of the mission, last year, were \$36.81, which the missionary gratefully acknowledges. The Depot, at 202 King street east, Toronto, is still kept open.

HELD UP A TRAIN

SHOT MINER DEAD BECAUSE HE PROTESTED.

Wounded Another Person—Desperadoes Got Aboard at Pittsburg, Went Through Cars and Secured \$100.

Pittsburg, Kansas, March 5.—The Missouri Pacific passenger train which left here last evening, was held up by two men in disguise, and Lou Jeff, a colored miner, employed at the camp 31, of the Central Coal & Coke company, was killed because he protested, and W. L. Westlake, of Toledo, Ohio, who, with his wife and two children, had been visiting relatives in Kansas, was shot through the hand by a bullet that had been fired at the negro.

There were few passengers on the train and the robbers got about \$100 in cash and a few watches and revolvers.

The men were disguised only with false mustaches and goatees. One left a colored minor, between 150 and 190 pounds, while the other weighed about 160. Both had dark complexions and wore dark slouch hats and dark clothes. They boarded the train at Pittsburg and began "working" the train as it moved toward Kansas City Southern railroad shops.

They began at the smoking car. One robber walked ahead with a large revolver in his hand and quietly asked the passengers to "hold out" to the man behind, who followed him closely. They were not far behind the train auditor and followed him into the day coach. When they came to him in the day coach, he at once realized that a hold-up was going on.

After the auditor had passed, he drew a revolver and shot at the foremost robber, who shot twice at the negro in return. The first shot went wild, and struck Westlake, but the second hit the negro in the head and killed him instantly. The robbers then quietly made the auditor deliver his money, and hurriedly left the train as it entered the yards at Cornell.

Westlake, the wounded passenger, was taken to Liberal, where his hand was treated by a surgeon of the railroad company. As soon as confirmation could be had with Agent Donahy, of Pittsburg, a switch engine with several officers was sent to Cornell four miles from here, where the country surrounding Pittsburg is thickly settled, and is dotted with villages and mining camps. It is reported that the news that a miner was killed by the bandits has aroused hundreds of other miners, who will attempt to capture and lynch the robbers.
