Local grain merchants state that there are no changes in prices. Millers have been unable to secure more than a small percentage of the Manitoba wheat they have required, and Ontario wheat continues firm. Report says that should the predicted decrease in the Russian crop be fulfilled, it will afford a splendid opening for the surplus yields of the United States and Canada. It is further stated, however, that it is risky to speculate in a shortage in the Russian exports.

Several large shipments of pressed hay were made out of the city within the past few days, and although it was reported that the trade was about over for the season, this does not appear to be the case. At one time, on Monday afternoon, no less than seven sleighs, heavily laden with hay, were noticed on Ontario street.

In Montreal, dressed hogs are firm, at \$10.25 per cwt. for fresh killed stock, and \$8.75 and \$9.50 for frozen country dressed. In Toronto the market is steady to firm. Dressed hogs, \$9.60 for lights, and 89 for heavies.

The chief trouble with a large herd of dairy cattle is in getting them milked properly, says an authority. The two main points in milking are gentleness and quickness. Of the two, quickness is the most essential, for a quick milker can seldom be a bad one. Few farmers are cruel, but a great number are slow. Experiments have been made regarding this matter of quick vs. slow milking, which prove that dilatory milking has some times the effect of reducing the butter fat in the milk to the extent of a dozen per cent, besides showing a decided diminution in the quantity. Scientists tell us that the formation of the milk largely takes place after the process of milking has begun. The distended vessel, or udder, contains but a small proportion of milk actually in a secreted or perfected condition. Prof. Stewart, a leading United States authority on the dairy cow, compares the secretion of milk to the secretion of tears; the latter only flows when there is mental excitement of a

It also has a tendency to produce a cloudy brine in butter, indicating an excess of buttermilk. A high churning temperature, is liable to injure the body of the butter, destroying the grain and imparting a greasy appearance.
