A FINE EDIFICE

THE TRINITY METHODIST CHURCH NAPANEE.

Was Dedicated on Sunday By President Rae—The Debt is Practically Wiped Out—A Handsome Church.

Napanee, March 12.—The dedication service in the new Trinity Methodist church was held on Sunday last.

Long before the hour for the opening people were on their way to gain admittance, and before the hour for the service to commence, the church, large as it is, was filled to overflowing. The day was gloriously bright and not a cloud appeared to dampen the spirits of the people.

The dedication sermon was preached by Rev. J. J. Rae, president of the conference, special music was prepared by the choir, and the organ was presided over by Mrs. (Dr.) Lockridge.

The following gentlemen were on the platform: The pastor, Rev. W. H. Sanday, Rev. J. R. Conn, Rev. J. J. Rae, Rev. H. Cairns, and Rev. R. Duke; and William Johnston, Belleville.

A grand Sunday school rally was held in the church on an afternoon brought delivered by William Johnston. The children and many others present were presented with badges inscribed, "Trinity church Sunday school opening, Napanee, Ont., March 10th. I was there."

At the evening service Rev. J. J. Rae preached a very fine sermon, which was listened to by the large audience with rapt attention. At the morning service over 1,200 people were present; the collection amounted to about \$100. At the Sunday school services in the afternoon about \$250 was handed in, and at the evening service over 1,500 people were present.

Taking the collections at the services, proceeds of the tea and the subscriptions, the debt of the church is practically wiped out.

The tea meeting on Monday night, was a greater success than expected. About 1,200 people were dined with the delicacies of the season. The ladies who had charge of this part of the entertainment, were kind and faithfully and had the pleasure of seeing the result of their labors in the crowded tables that were filled again and again with the number of people who had received tickets.

The beautiful new Trinity church is certainly one that Napaneeans may well be proud of. It is equal to any edifice, and in the estimation of many, far surpasses the majority of city churches. It is built of pressed cement blocks, and somewhat of the gothic architecture. The inside is finished in natural wood and the seating is in the latest style. The church is lighted by natural light with myriads of electric bulbs and the stained glass windows, with the two memorial windows, give a finish and style to the whole building. Nothing was omitted in the construction of this church that would add to the comfort and convenience of the most exacting.

Representative Champ Clark of Missouri, a democrat, and a warm friend of the president, said: "I believe that the president was honest in his statement on the night of the election in 1904, that he would not accept another nomination. I believe that if he can be convinced, however, that, unless he is nominated, some reactionary would be nominated, he would accept."

POLICE CIRCLES

STORIES TOLD CONCERNING WORK OF BLUECOATS.

All Manner of Complaints Reach the Station—The Death Penalty to Be Put Upon a Dog—A Mother Wanted to Detain Her Son.

Magistrate Farrell will, on Friday morning, hear the case of Frank Redden, a young man who is accused of assaulting Isaac Bennock, the Jew, who lodged a complaint at the police station on Saturday morning. Bennock claims that three men attacked and injured him on Saturday morning. Redden is twenty-two years of age, and resides on Bagot street. He says that he is not guilty of the charge, and can prove his innocence. He was arrested by Constable Baleson on a warrant taken out by Bennock. The police have received a complaint about a dog having bitten a prominent Kingstonian. The name of the gentleman is not given for publication, but it is stated that his injuries are not of a serious nature. A close watch will be kept on the dog, however, and if the canine is found to be a vicious one it will be sentenced to the death penalty, via the revolver.

The police stations in the various cities are always the headquarters of the receiving of complaints of various kinds. Kingston's police station is no exception to the rule. Yesterday a woman hastened to the station to notify the officers that her son, a young man, intended to leave the city on the afternoon stage for Cape Vincent. She did not want him to go and asked that the police detain him. It was found that the son was well able to take care of himself. At any rate he knew enough to steer clear of the police, and whether or not he made the trip to the Cape is not yet known.

Some complaints have reached the police about unusual noise at a Chatham street house where dances are held quite frequently. Some police court proceedings are threatened unless the nuisance is stopped.

Consumption in Indiana Makes 214 Children Orphans in One Month.
