## A STRANGE STORY

### WAS KIDNAPED AND FORCED TO WED

**Wants Marriage Annulled—Business Man Swears He Was Tricked Into Cab, Taken to Brooklyn and Compelled to Take Bride.**

New York, March 14.—Declaring that he had been forced into a carriage in the heart of Manhattan's business district and whisked over to Brooklyn and then compelled to be married under duress and fraud, Warren R. Suydam, a wealthy business man, living at Woodhaven, L.I., has brought suit for the annulment of his marriage to Miss Phoebe Lott.

Miss Lott is a member of a prominent family of that name of Flatlands, a suburb of Brooklyn. The charges made by Suydam were disclosed when his wife entered suit for \$1,000,000 and \$1,000,000 counsel fees pending a settlement of the action brought by her husband.

Both of the principals in the suit are well-known in Brooklyn. Mr. Suydam is twenty-nine years old and is a descendant of a Dutch family, which was one of the first to settle on Long Island.

Suydam's complaint asserts that on December 21st a brother of Miss Lott called at the large dry goods establishment where he holds an important position, and by means of a ruse inveigled him into a carriage waiting outside of the store.

Mr. Suydam says that young Lott told him his sister was ill at her home and wished to see him. Suspecting nothing, he got into the carriage with the young man. They were driven rapidly to Brooklyn and thence to the Lott residence, where they were greeted by Miss Lott. Suydam asserts she was not ill and that when he discovered this fact his suspicions were aroused.

At this point, Suydam alleges, he was told that he would have to marry Miss Lott. A minister was on hand to perform the ceremony, and every detail had been arranged for it to be carried out then and there.

Suydam says he was attempted to be sent to the minister officiating without his clerical garb. This difficulty was soon overcome, he says, and the necessary vestments were brought to the house. In her application for alimony and counsel fees, Mrs. Suydam denies that her husband had been forced into the marriage.

## ACCUSED OF MURDERS.

**Caught in Panama and Taken to Frisco.**

New York, March 14.—After a search lasting nearly a year and a half, Charles Henry Rogers, accused of three murders, has been caught.

Rogers, it is alleged, killed Frederick R. and Willis C. Olney, wealthy farmers of Middletown, N.Y., and Alice Ingersoll, the nine-year-old daughter of their housekeeper, at the home of the latter's mother, Mrs. Martin Ingerick.

The man was arrested in Panama and is now in San Francisco in the custody of detectives on his way to New York.

Rogers disappeared immediately after the triple murder, which occurred on October 17, 1905. He left a wife and five children behind.

The deceased lady, ninety-three years of age, was a resident of St. Catharines for years. She leaves two daughters, Mrs. R. Stewart, of Buffalo, and Mrs. Hutchison, of Kingston. The remains were interred at St. Catharines on Tuesday.

**Appointed Rhodes Scholar.**

Norman Macdonnell, a third-year student in arts at Queen's University, and a son of the late Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, of Toronto, has been chosen as Queen's second Rhodes scholar for Oxford, Mr. Macdonnell will go to England next September. His cousin, James Macdonnell, M.A., of this city, was the first Queen's man to get a Rhodes scholarship two years ago.

**Looking For Work.**

George Billings, an Englishman who has only been in Canada three months, arrived in Kingston, from Montreal, this morning, and was in search of work. He said that he had been working for the corporation on the streets of Montreal, but that he did not care for the work and one told him that he would be able to secure employment in Kingston.

**Queen's College Notes.**

Dr. Gowen will be "At Home" to the final year in science this evening. The year is invited to dine with the professor and stay for the evening.

The year's work has been completed in some of the subjects and classes are beginning to close. The final grind has commenced, and the students are not seen around the city.

Considerable interest is being shown in the athletic tournament which takes place at the end of the month. The membership of the association, it was stated in the report, was 1,222, a gain of 875 in less than five years. The work extended over 7,200,000 acres of dominion forest reserve.

**Woman Suicides.**

Fredrickton, N.B., March 14.—Mrs. R. L. Black took her life by drinking carbolic acid. For years Mrs. Black, the daughter of Mrs. Blackmer, a widow, was employed as a stenographer in law offices and was energetic in Presbyterian church work. She leaves a husband and baby.

**Wall Paper Factory Burns.**

New Brunswick, N.Y., March 14.—The big wall paper factory of Janeway & Carpenter was damaged to the extent of \$200,000 by fire, and 500 persons were thrown temporarily out of work.

**Baby Burned To Death.**

Dorchester, N.B., March 14.—Oswell, the three-year-old son of Carwell Spence, was burned to death. The child set fire to its clothing while the mother was out visiting a sick woman.

### OCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Alberta will spend \$200,000 in telephone construction.

Fire at Borsano, Italy, rendered two thousand peasants homeless.

Ohio and parts of Pennsylvania are flooded, owing to thaws and heavy rains.

An order-in-council is to be passed establishing a forest reserve about Ottawa.

The stockroom of the glove and mitten factory at Ingersoll, was gutted by fire.

C. M. Wilson has been appointed assistant general manager of the York Radio company.

The Bell Telephone company has offered \$20,000 a year for an exclusive franchise of Toronto.

The Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, Montreal, will not hold the annual regatta club ball this year.

Gen. William Booth, the chief officer of the Salvation Army, visited the Ontario legislature this afternoon.

The Quebec legislature has granted a pension to the mother of Miss Sarah Maxwell, victim of the Hochelaga school fire.

Uriah Wilson, conservative M.P. for Lennox, is aspiring to be the leader of the tariff reform element in the conservative party.

The Allan line SS. Mongolian, from Glasgow, arrived at Halifax this morning. Passengers: 176 second cabin and 401 steerage.

Captain May Mitchell, of the Salvation Army, died suddenly on Sunday in New Liskeard. She was a daughter of James Claxton, Toronto.

The federal government will expend the sum of two million dollars this year in improving the St. Lawrence route, from Montreal to the sea.

President Wilcox, of the Delaware & Hudson railroad, has announced that there have been only three passenger fatalities on its road in twelve years.

Mr. Girard, M.P.P., Rouville, will hold a mass meeting, at Marieville, Que., on Sunday, to protest against the appointment of Senator Desaulles.

The third session of the eighth parliament of the province of Quebec was prorogued this afternoon by Lieutenant-Governor Jette, with the usual ceremonies.

Justice Fitzgerald, New York, has sustained Mr. DeLama upon the completion of arguments for and against the admission, as evidence, of the testimony of A. B. Hummel.

At Fannystelle, Man., the seven-year-old son of F. W. Beattie, while playing with a gun in the absence of his parents, shot and instantly killed his little brother, aged three.

Peterboro can purchase the plant and business of the Peterboro Light and Power company in order to generate and sell power on the terms imposed by the Hydro-Electric commission.

Hereafter the union of Canadian municipalities shall consist of the different provincial unions, the municipalities forming the provincial union, and those federate to make the dominion union.

Swartzward, the New Haven, Conn., man, who married the dining room cashier of the Queen's Hotel, Montreal, while having a wife and six children in New Haven, was sentenced to two years imprisonment.

A special trip to enable the members of the Ontario legislature and various members of the provincial government to see the wealth of the Algonquin Park as a national asset has been arranged by the Ontario fish and game commission leaves Toronto on Friday.

George H. Barr, London, in charge of the construction in dairy work in Western Ontario, including the dairy school at Strathroy, has resigned to enter the service of the Dominion government, as head of the dairy branch of the fruit and dairying departments.

Sixteen claims of copper, gold, silver and zinc on Haskins mountain, at McDame Creek, in the Laird district, B.C., were recently purchased by Rosenthal, Kurz and Hirschel, of Chicago. Workmen are to be carried out on a vast scale, and an expenditure of \$1,500,000 is planned.

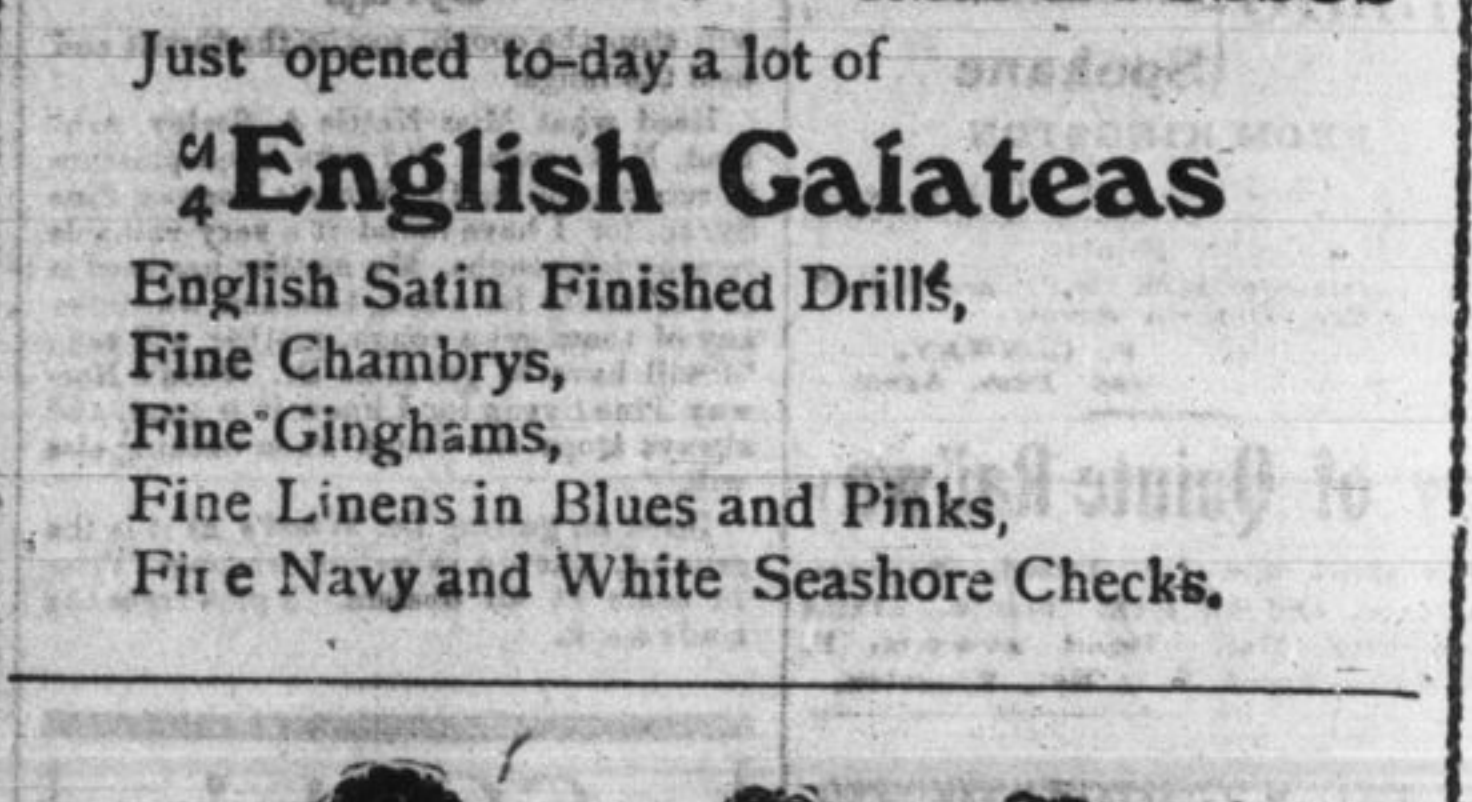
