PITH OF THE NEWS.
The Very Latest Cullied From All Over The World.
Felix Latour, a Hull barber, died in a fit of hiccoughs, Turkey, Fowl.
Maurice Grau, the opera manager, died in Paris yesterday.
Renfrew, the Ottawa Valley champion, has challenged for the Stanley Cup.
Rider Haggard told army emigrants that in Canada "every man has a chance."
Hon. Walter Scott will spend some time at Bermuda. His health is greatly improved.
A motion to repeal the Irish crimes act has been passed in the British House of Commons.
The tourist route to Muskoka will be much lower than ever this summer, owing to competition.
The Orange Grand Lodge, of West-ern Ontario, meeting at Orangeville, elected E. T. Ewary, London, grand master.
A C.P.R. express ran into a wrecking train on a curve near Port Arthur. One man, a Mr. Palmer, Rossport, was killed.
A proposal to set aside 250,000 acres in New Ontario for the Salvation Army, has been made to the Ontario government.
After the Press Club luncheon, in Toronto, Hon. J. W. St. John slipped on the stairs and fell heavily, injuring his left shoulder and knee.
From February 1st, 1904, to March 31st, 1906, the railways of Canada killed 402 people, a large number of whom were trespassers on the tracks.
Guard Chamberlain, of the Stony Mountain penitentiary, testified at the Winnipeg assizes that prisoners placed in the penalty cells are sometimes denied water.
Prince Gagarin, director of the Poly-technic Institute of St. Petersburg, has been discharged for permitting the sheltering of arms and ammunition on the premises, for revolutionary purposes.
Fourteen science sophomores in McGill, for their actions in connection with the ammonia throwing incident, have been suspended from all privileges in the McGill union until September, 1907.
The proprietor of an estate in Elizabethburg, Russia, five laborers, and a woman have been murdered by robbers.
An attempt was also made in the same town to bring on a massacre of Jews, but it was frustrated by troops.
Hon. J. P. Whitney has assumed the duties of acting minister of lands, forests and mines, on the departure of Hon. Frank Cochrane, who will take a trip to the Mediterranean, making a short stay in Great Britain, with several members of his family.
Hon. Louis F. Brodeur, minister of marine and fisheries, denies the statement credited to Mr. Girard, of the Quebec legislature, that he had an arrangement whereby a newly-appointed senator merely kept the seat warm for him to take when the next general election came around.

LORD CURZON

Won Out For Chancellor Of Oxford.

POLITICS IN CASE

ROSEBERY DID NOT GET HALF VOTES OF OTHER.
Britain Would Enter Into Communications if it is Deemed Necessary Should Any Tariff Arrangement Between Germany and United States Be Adverse to Britain.

London, March 15.—Foreign Secretary Grey was asked, in the house of commons, yesterday, whether the government would take steps to ensure that any tariff arrangement between Germany and the United States would not operate adversely to British trade. Sir Edward replied that should an arrangement between United States and Germany be concluded Great Britain would enter into such communications as should be required.
Lord Curzon, of Kedleston, ex-secr-etary of India, was elected chancellor of Oxford university by 1,111 votes over 420 cast for Lord Rosebery. Litter-ature in the history of the university chanc-ellors had been chosen without a contest. Yesterday's contest had a political aspect, Lord Curzon being a con-servative and Lord Rosebery a liberal, excited the keenest interest.

HE REFUSED TO GO
W. C. GUERIN WOULD NOT
ELOPE AS ARRANGED.

Chicago Police Have a New Theory to Explain Why Mrs. McDonald Used a Revolver on the Man She Was So Deeply Infatuated With.
Chicago, March 15.—Mrs. Dora McDonald, wife of Michael McDonald, ex-pected to receive the honor of being killed and Webster S. Guerin, it was declared, to-day, because he broke his promise to elope to New York with her.
This startling theory was advanced by Herman Schuetler, assistant chief of police, and his detectives.
The theory, it is said, is based on the testimony of witnesses, who, it is declared, heard a quarrel between Guerin and the woman prior to the shooting.
The police assert they have learned that complete arrangements had been made between Guerin and Mrs. McDonald for the elopement. At the last moment Guerin, it is said, remembered his mother, whose heart had been broken by former escapades, and he resisted the temptation held out by the girl to elope with her.
Mrs. McDonald's condition remains unchanged and she is expected to recover. She will be unable to attend the trial.

SLEW MISSIONARIES.

Shanghai, March 15.—It is reported, from Chinese sources, that a Wesleyan mission has been destroyed, and missionaries were killed.

SOLD HER DAUGHTER'S SOUL.
Evelyn Thaw's Mother Arraigned by Relatives.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 15.—In a siz-ling signed statement the mother and sister of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw's father have come out and blamed Evelyn's mother, Mrs. Charles J. Holman, as responsible for all the troubles of the wife of the man on trial for the murder of Stanford White.
The mother is solemnly arraigned as "a human monster." The state-ment was drawn up at Miles City, Mont., on March 4th, and has just been received in Pittsburg. It is signed by Eliza J. Nesbit, mother of W. S. Nesbit, Evelyn's father, and Carrie Moore, Mrs. Holman's sister-in-law, sisters of W. S. Nesbit, and in part says:
"She knew she was sacrificing her child's soul for money by which to live in luxury. Her mother, a true mother, she would have taken in washing before putting her daughter out as an artist's model or chorus girl, knowing what temptations under such circumstances would be placed in the child's way. Even a dumb brute would protect its young, but this woman turned against her daughter. Evelyn's father's family was known in Pittsburg and Allegheny City as a family whose men were brave and honorable and whose women were vir-tuous. As for Mrs. Charles J. Hol-man, the people of Pittsburg and Al-legheny City should rise in their in-dignation and burn her in effigy."

FLOODS ARE DREADFUL.
And Have Damaged Property in Three States.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 15.—Alarming reports of floods are pouring into the city from almost every town in West-ern Pennsylvania, West Virginia and parts of Ohio. Hundreds are homeless throughout the three states. Bridges are down everywhere, and traffic is generally suspended throughout a wide area. In the city nearly 100,000 people are out of work from the flood, and the water is still rising. It is now almost up to the thirty-four foot level, the highest reached in twenty-five years. The loss in Pittsburg will be at least a million dollars. In the Erie region, too, the damage will be very great.

Conviction Quashed.

Toronto, March 15.—The court of appeal quashed the conviction of Charles M. Hayes, president of the Grand Trunk for plotting to furnish a two cent mile service. The court holds that if any action lies it should be against the company and not against the president.
A matrimonial surprise came on March 7th, in the announcement of the marriage of John Ernest Toeber, and Miss Ethel Walters, both of Leam-ore. The ceremony was performed at the Congregational mans. Middleville.
At a large and representative meet-ing of the Bohemian congregation held on Tuesday, Rev. James A. McLean, Vest, Minn., was given a hearty, un-animous call to become pastor of the church.
John Forsthe has sold his sawmill at Hall's Mills to Colin Willows of Leam-ore, who intends running the mill.

MADE DELIVERY
Of Southern Pacific Into Har-
man's Hands.

New York, March 15.—Edwin Haw-ley's name has come greatly into prom-inence in connection with the invest-ment of E. H. Harriman's railroad ac-quisitions. It was he who was largely responsible for the delivery of Southern Pacific into Mr. Harriman's hands. Later, he played a large part in taking the Alton from the same hands.
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STOCKS DROP
There Was Complete Pan-
ic On Thursday.

NO FAILURES, HOWEVER, WERE REPORTED.
Officials of Clearing House and Bankers Had a Conference in New York and it Was Declared That Not a Bank Wanted Aid or Asked For It.
New York, March 15.—In the stock market, yesterday, there were losses of from \$10 to \$20 in many railway and industrial securities, which have long been known as standard invest-ment stocks. In the case of Reading and Union Pacific, the loss exceeded \$20 a share. In the total of securities on the list there were heavy net losses, representing in the aggregate more than half a million dollars, to say nothing of the losses in the out-side market and resultant losses in markets in other cities. The average decline in twenty railway stocks, used for statistical purposes, was \$7.81 a share, as against \$5.10 on the pre-ceeding day.
The market, as the figures show, lapsed from the condition of demoral-ization prevailing on the previous day and on two days of last week, into one of absolute panic. Yet, whatever the clearing house sheets may disclose, on the show down, this morning, no failure was reported up to late last evening. The situation is regarded as amazing. Late yesterday afternoon there was an informal conference of officials of the clearing house and re-presentatives of some of the largest clearing house banks. By personal interview and by telephone the situa-tion was thoroughly canvassed and every effort was made to locate weak spots. In the language of a prom-inent clearing house official this was the result of the informal action: "Not a single bank wants aid or is asking for it."

USED DYNAMITE
To Stop the Advance of Flames
in Pittsburg.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 15.—A big fire raged on the south side district of this city. The entire block on the north side of Carson street, between 13th and 14th street, was on fire. The large plant of the Oliver Steel Flow company was threatened. The fire de-stroyed the plant of the American Sheet and Tinsmith company, and slightly damaged the bolt works of the Oliver Iron and Steel works adjoining. Loss about \$20,000.
A second fire broke out on Mount Washington at ten o'clock. Eleven business and dwellings were destroyed. Dynamite was used to check the fire, no water being available.

NO SUCH A THING.
As a Brain Storm Said One of
Alienists.

New York, March 15.—The cross-ex-amination of Dr. Austin Flint, the alienist, was the first taken up in the Thaw case, this morning. Dr. William Hirsch, an expert, testified that Thaw was not laboring under such a delu-sion of reason that he did not know that his killing of White was wrong. Dr. Hirsch testified that there was no such thing as a brainstorm.

LYNCH LAW RESORTED TO.
Monroe, La., March 15.—Flint Wil-liams and Henry Gardner, young ne-groes, were taken from the jail, this morning, and hanged. Both negroes confessed to having, with a third ne-gro, shot and robbed two Italians, on Monday night.

BILL IS ADOPTED
AND WILL NOW GO TO THE
HOUSE.

The Important Amendments That Are Proposed For the In-surance Act—Members of Parlia-ment Giving Testimony.
Toronto, March 15.—The special committee of the legislature which has had under consideration Mr. Hoyle's bill to amend the Ontario Insurance act, this morning, passed the bill with some amendments which do not change the principle and the measure will be taken up in the committee of the whole house on Monday. The im-portant features of the bill are: "En-abling insurance companies to invest in school debentures, allowing com-panies incorporated in Ontario to hold their meetings outside of the province, but not outside of the dom-inion, enabling the insured person to make a will changing the beneficiary of the policy, the date of the will to decide the same, and making the wife a legal heir to insurance monies."
J. F. Miller and A. H. Jackson have issued writs against the Erie Cobalt Silver Mining company and R. Jew-ell. They ask to have set aside the contract made with the defendants for the exchange of certain shares of the capital stock on the Beaver Silver Cobalt company for shares of the de-fendant company and to recover the shares delivered.
