**A NEW VIEW POINT**

**THE LANDOWNERS HAVE NEVER BENEFITED**

From the Waterworks—Ald. Chown's Scheme Commended—Dr. Ackroyd Answers a Critic on the Toll Road Question.

Kingston, March 13.—(To the Editor) I have been much interested in the controversy between Aids. Chown and Craig. It is quite plain to me that the former is in the right, as the result of adopting his original plan would work injustice to a class that, however useful they may be to the community, gets too little consideration these days. I refer to the landowners of the city, some of us men who have held our land ready for a demand to spring up for many years.

By Ald. Chown's scheme, evidently the rate of taxation would be lowered to us, and who can better afford to be at the expense of it than those householders who for a score of years have enjoyed, and still continue to enjoy, all the benefits of the cheapest water service? But with us, our land being vacant, we have not participated in this advantage; it has been all on the other side.

So I claim that if Ald. Chown can put his reform into operation to reduce the rate from twenty mills to fifteen or sixteen mills, it will be quite a step in the right direction. Household, be they tenants or owners, can very well afford to do so this tardy justice, they having had all the benefits of the water works purchase while our unused lands have had none.

It may appear to those who do not reflect that we are entitled to no consideration, and indeed in a fast-growing city it could not be urged so forcibly as in Kingston, where our property meets with so dull a demand. Some of us have held our lands for twenty, thirty, and even forty years, and paying taxes all these years, too. And this should be remembered—that land, if built on, finds a tenant, who not only pays all the taxes, but the cost of the water, while, with unimproved lands there is no such relief possible and we have to hold and wait for a demand to spring up. This holding of vacant lands may appear to be a small matter, but it is indeed quite the contrary, and the holders comprise most of our prominent citizens, too. Within the corporation of Kingston fully seventy-five per cent. of the land is unimproved. This is a large amount, and the gentlemen who have held it so long are, I think, rightfully entitled to some such relief as would surely result from Ald. Chown's proposal. True, Ald. Chown has not claimed this merit for his plan, but, no doubt, he fully sees the force of it just the same.

Indeed, now that we have had valuations and improvements values assessed separately, we ought to have two rates of taxation say twenty mills for improvements on land and ten mills for land alone. This would tend to approximate our system of taxation to what has been the practice in England for centuries.

But this would carry the reform beyond the competence of the city council and would, I think, necessitate an act of the Ontario legislature before rates could be so differentiated. In the meantime, Ald. Chown's plan would work a start in the right direction—LANDOWNER.

**Dr. Ackroyd and Toll Roads.**  
Kingston, March 11.—(To the Editor) In last night's issue of the Whig, some one signing "Fair Play" replies to my letter of last Saturday on the toll question. I am pleased to see a reply and a criticism, for in this way the question of freeing the roads may be advanced. I wish, however, your correspondent had given his name to your readers as I don't care to reply to anonymous writers.

I know nothing about the politics of the county council and have no desire to ridicule any of its members, but the action taken by the council was disappointing to many who would like to see the roads freed of toll gates. There are very few counties in Ontario that have toll gates, and we are looked upon by all outsiders who visit us as a backward community. I would most assuredly go in for some scheme such as "Fair Play" proposed to free all the roads of the county. The petname of the other roads is as valuable to the city as that of the Perth Road, but if we can't get a whole loaf we would like a half loaf, and then we would have something to work on to get the balance of the loaf.

I appreciate my critic's viewpoint when he says: "Is it fair to ask the users of the Bath, Portland and Storrington roads to give money to free the Perth Road and be subject to the same toll tax that they have now?" No, this would scarcely be fair, but it seems to overlook the fact that my proposition provides for compensation to those townships, or sections of the county, not benefited directly by the purchase of the Perth Road. I emphasized the purchase of the Perth Road now because it seemed to be an opportune time to do it. The Loughboro Lake bridge has to be repaired at the county's expense. I understand, and the county would have received the grant from the government for rebuilding bridges, and also the grant towards the purchase of roads, besides a better bargain could be made with the Perth Road company now probably than later on.

"Fair Play" says "the keeping the roads in repair is of greater importance than the freeing of them. Would he have us infer from that that the toll roads are kept in a good state of repair? How much do they spend per annum on them? Not more than they can help. See how quickly the Perth Road abandoned the Loughboro Lake bridge, when they should have repaired it, and now the county has to do it, so that the people on the other side of the bridge may have the privilege of paying toll to the owners of the road. I would ask "Fair Play" is that fair? It is calculated that it would require \$7,000 a year to keep the county roads that are now under, and have been under, the toll gate system in repair. Did the county spend that much? I will venture to say they did not. There is no standard for them to go

by and consequently we have no guarantee what kind of roads we may have. However, it is not a question of good roads vs. toll roads we are discussing now, but a question of free roads, even if they are full of "toll holes." They can be attended to later. I am not convinced that because all the roads of the county are not freed from toll, the Perth Road should not be now. If one road at a time were freed the burden on the tax payer would be easier borne.

May our friend "Fair Play" take a more statesmanlike view of our social and economic relations than the ward politician, who will vote for nothing unless his street is in it. Reform is usually slow, and if we are not willing to make some sacrifices for progress and the good of the community, we are not taking the part of good citizens.—S. A. AYKROYD.
